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CARTRIDGE PLEAT—Requires 11 inches of 4" ribbon for 4" pocket. (Fig. 1) Baste 1" tucks spaced 1" from each other on wrong side. (Fig. 2) Stitch all the way down. Roll-hem raw edges. Hem to dress on three sides.







BRAID-For braiding see page 9. Material: 5 strands, 1 yard each, for pocket 41" in diameter. Materials: tubular grosgrain, velvet, satin. (Fig. 1) Start at center. (Fig. 2) Slip stitch around outer edges. (Fig. 3) Tack to dress.

Requires 13 yds. of 1" ribbon. Baste. Stitch both sides by machine. Be careful to line up sleeve trim with bodice. Ribbon: velvet, satin, moire, grosgrain.

24 inches of 4" wide ribbon tied into a Tailored Bow (see page 14) or Debutante Bow (page 10) and tacked along the top. Bind short sleeves to match with 2" ribbon. Ribbons: grosgrain, velvet, moire, fancy, plaids, checks.

Dundung

For dress jackets and unlined coats, use special binding ribbon. (Fig. 1) Stitch one edge of binding to under side of

seam's raw edge. (Fig. 2) Fold binding over raw edge and stitch. For hemming, stitch binding over raw edge and hem to skirt.





BLESSINGS FOR BUDGETEERS



Each pocket is 3" square. The squares are made by joining 3 inches of 1" moire in red, white and blue and overcasting on left side. Pin one square to blouse and stitch on three sides. Place second square as sketched, pin and stitch on three sides.



To match your skirt, hat, or blouse, use three colors, 1 yd. each of 3" ribbon. To join, overcast edges on left side. Hand roll hem, top and bottom. Ribbons: moire, satin, grosgrain, velvet,



If you're tired of a tailored blouse, give it new fashion inspiration with a fly front applique in a contrasting color. Pin 2" grosgrain, covering buttonholes, and stitch a blouse on right side only. This same idea is grand for dresses and sweaters. It's practical over zippers too. Ribbons: grosgrain, velveteen.



Convert a plain blouse into a stunning ensemble by matching the ribbon to your skirt. Pin six rows of tubular ribbon from shoulder or yoke line to hem.

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Accessories

FOR THAT "DRESSMAKER LOOK" AT LITTLE COST



Belts

BRAIDED—Materials: Five strands of colors desired, each 1¼ yds. long for a 36" finished size. Regular or tubular

grosgrain. For braiding instructions, see page 9. Finish with smart buckle.

COVERED CUTIE—Use old belt or buckram for stiffening. Use ribbon twice as wide as belt. Cover front. Overcast stitches in back. Turn ends under to a point. Use two extra lengths of 13 inches each for knot tie. Pleat one end. Pin under pointed end and stitch firmly to belt. Tie soft ribbon into bow knot.



Use an old body or new untrimmed one. Join four 20 inch strips of 4" ribbon by

overcasting edges on left side. Seam across the bottom. Gather both ends about ½" from edge, and ease to fit the body. Tack to body at gathers and seam. Finish with ½ yard strap of ½" ribbon. Materials: velvet, grosgrain.



pleats on 2 yards of 3" ribbon.
Start at right end and work pleats underneath to center. At left end re-

peat. Finish at center with box pleat. Tack each pleat. For roundness, ease outer edges. Press in a perfect circle. Finish with 1 yard of velvet. Cuff: $\frac{3}{4}$ yards of 3" ribbon and $\frac{1}{2}$ yard velvet. Materials: Roman Stripe, grosgrain, velvet.

Evening Shows

Join seven 1 yard strips of 4½" velvet (enough strips to make a square. See Fig. 1) by overcasting edges. Fold to form a triangle. Seam on left side (like Fig. 2, "A" and "B"). Turn to right side and slip-stitch remaining opening. Material simulative pattern library ong 2018 moire, satin.



Indies

How to inject new life into old slips. One yard of 1" ribbon for shoulder straps. Bind hem with 1" ribbon. Revitalize panties with new snug-fitting bands and cute rosettes. Materials: See list below.



Keep their heavenly look with fresh ribbons woven into straps, bodice, waistline and finished with perky bows. Materials: satins, velvets, regular and tubular grosgrains, moire, polka dots, Roman Stripes





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Hat Band Lining

The twinkling of a stitch will give your hat that fastidious look. Just put in a new band of grosgrain. Start at back and slightly to the right of center. Join to hat with small basting stitches at outer edge of grosgrain. To finish, turn grosgrain under so that seam is centered and hem across widths of ribbon.





Hat Bands

Tailored hats thrive from season to season under constant ribbon changes. Side bow requires 4" ribbon. Begin pinning on right side and work half way round. Twist ribbon once and continue till it meets. Baste every 2". For bow, see Debutante Bow, page 10. Finish with same width ribbon folded in half and tacked underneath.

Snapon Bows

Harmonize your hats to your ensembles by sewing on bows or trimmings with snaps.

Pill Box Miracle

If you're hat feels like a pill every time you wear it, transform it into a darling "chapeaux" with three bows, as sketched. (See Debutante Bows, page 10.) Hat stays on with about 17 inches of 2" wide ribbon. Tack one end to hat, turn ribbon at center and tack other end. Sew large Debutante bow over turn of ribbon.






Treat yourself to glamour galore with this ensemble. Pert sailor trimmed with contrasting ribbon and contrasting muff (velvet sketched). Use ribbon twice width of upturned edge. Start at back. Fold ribbon over edge and join with "liquid thread". Crown band is treated with narrow ribbon twisted to form a roll and tacked in place. See Pillbox above for back band instructions. See page 7

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

Yompadowr' With pompadours gracing so many faces, this little hat, specially designed for them, reaches new fashion heights. The original sold for well over \$15. You can make it yourself for the cost of the ribbon and feather. First braid five strands of tubular grosgrains, each 5 yards long. (See bottom of page for braiding.) (Fig. 1) Take end and join 10 inches away with back stitch across width. (Fig. 2) Slipstitch along lower edge using dark thread only. First row is sewn diagonally until braid lies flat. (Fig. 3) Join three rows. (Fig. 4) To add, sew three strands of upper braid to one of lower. (Fig. 5) Fourth row, add on both sides. Fifth row, add in front and back. Sixth row, sides. Seventh row, front and back. Finish by sewing diagonally underneath as step 3. Join with backstitch across width. Take buckram 3" wide and ten inches long. Join 3" ends. Tack under top three rows of braid. Feather trim.



Dozens of interesting tricks start with this simple braid. Pin five pieces of ribbon all same width in a row as in Fig. 1. Weave them together by taking fifth strand, laying it under fourth, over third, under second and over first. Then begin with fourth strand weaving under and over just as before. Keep repeating, weaving with the last strand at right (Fig. 2). Simple, isn't it? Materials: regular grosgrain or satin in $1\frac{1}{2}$, 2, or 3 inch widths or tubular grosgrain.

For belt and pocket, see pages 7 and 4.

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Nothing gives baby's caps more lovely crispness than fresh ribbons. Rosettes require 18 inches each of 1" ribbon—band, \(\frac{3}{4} \) yard (see page 10 for Rosettes). Materials: satin pastels.

Hillous

Sketched is a hemstitched loop thru which is woven $1\frac{1}{2}''$ satin, finished with a Festive bow. (See page 10 for Festive as well as other bow trimmings for pillows). Materials: pastel satins, polka dots, moires.

Childrens Dresses

You don't have to be a magician to make your little girl look the prettiest—just keep her dresses crisp with ribbon sashes and bows. Materials: sashes and bow, $1\frac{1}{2}$ yards of 4" ribbon. Rosettes and streamers: 1 yd. of $1\frac{1}{2}$ " ribbon.



Bindings Wonograms

How to refresh frayed edges on baby blankets: Bind them with 4 inch satin. Pencil monograms on blanket. Measure ribbon to fit your sketch allowing $\frac{1}{8}$ " for hem where edges are raw. Stitch to blanket.

Carriage Covers

Your carriage will shine the prettiest in any parade with gorgeous Rosettes trimming the cover and pillow. For a full size Rosette, use 13/4 yards of 3" satin on cover, and 11/4 yards of 11/2" satin on pillow. (See page 10 for Rosettes) Crocheted carriage covers have that professional look with ribbon woven in and out of border. Finish the back opening of the pillow cover with a ribbon binding for extra wear. Materials: regular and double faced satin and moire.

Lamp Shades

Boudoir Bows require 12 inches of 1" ribbon for each. To give the wires of the lampshade a pretty finish, cover them with Seam Binding in a harmonious color. Materials: grosgrain, velvet, satin, moire, checks.

was Tanging

Tie two Picture Bows first. To make a Picture Bow, take 12" of 1½" ribbon and fold so that ends meet in back. Stitch to hold. Cover center with same ribbon, pinched to shape and tacked in back. Cut streamers as long as desired. Tack top bow and bottom of streamer to wall and hang pictures over them in the regular manner. Materials: velvet, satin, grosgrain, moire.

Make worn bindings look new with ribbons. Use 3", 4", or 5" widths. Fold ribbon in half and bind so that ribbon covers top and bottom, stitching both

Take 24 inches of $1\frac{1}{2}$ " ribbon. (Fig. 1) Crease $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches on both sides of center. (Fig. 2) Cross loose ends. (Fig. 3) Bring one end over top. (Fig. 4) Fold over and tie in a knot.

nsaving Table Skirt

Only Boudoir Bows can give that air of crisp femininity. For the upper band, measure the 3 sides of the table and use 2" ribbon to fit. Pin the ruffled skirt to the ribbon and stitch ribbon at both edges. Tie eight Boudoir Bows using 24 inches of 1½" ribbon for each. Pin to skirt. Then tack streamers in place. Stitch bows over streamers. Materials: grosgrain, velvet, satin, moire, checks.

arro MALO

Boudoir Bows, made with 24 inches of 1½" ribbon, look adorable on dressing table chairs—and they're so simple to make. Follow instructions above and tack in place. You'll love them on the back of slipcovered chairs too.

Collect all your little scraps of ribbons and fabrics. Every time you remodel a dress, or stitch a new set of slip covers, save the scraps and sew them together in odd shapes. Keep a supply of new ribbons in different colors and materials on hand to give the quilt a fresh feeling. When you've reached the size you want, line it with muslin and back it with sateen. Bind the edges with 4" satin.

For smart simplicity at a very little cost try this wonder worker on your windows. Use plain materials for the curtains and bind sides and bottom with 3" ribbon folded in half to form 1½ inch border.

For valance, mark off five scallops and bind them and sides with same ribbon.

You can make those cute tie-backs jiffy-quick. Tie a Boudoir Bow using 24 inches of 3" ribbon. Then take 4 inches of same ribbon, fold in half, and sew snaps on both ends. Tack the Boudoir Bow to the center of the strip and presto! Smart, serviceable tie-backs that can be adjusted quickly. Materials: Checks, plaids, polka dots, fancies.





This stunning pillow can be made in college or club colors. Use any suitable material for the back of pillow. For the front, take a 12" square of muslin, baste twelve 12 inch strips of 1" ribbon across the top, alternating colors. Then tack one 12" strip at side and weave across, tacking at other end. Continue with rest of strips until completely woven. Requires 43 yards of each color and 6 yards for the ruffles. For first ruffle, baste 3 yards, shirr, and stitch \(\frac{1}{4}\)" from edge of pillow. Stitch second ruffle in contrasting color at edge. Join front to back. Materials: Satin, velvet, grosgrain, moire.

You can pretty-up a plain spread with ribbon bows and bands. Use $1\frac{1}{2}$ " ribbon for the bands stitching 2 strips where spread reaches edges of bed and 2 strips about 6 inches away. Tie eight Boudoir Bows (see page 12) in 1½" matching color. Pin between bands and stitch in place. To determine yardage for pillow ruffles measure the border and multiply by two. Baste the ribbon, shirr, pin in place and stitch to edge. Variations of this idea can be achieved by replacing tiny bows on side with one tremendous Festive or Butterfly Bow

(see page 10) in center and two smaller ones on pillows or one smaller one on a bolster.
