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Directions for Filet Crochet Work

The tighter the thread is held, the firmer and more even the work, and if crocheted closely, the following table can be relied upon. However, practice alone will enable the worker to crochet tightly enough to follow this table, and if the thread is loosely held, the meshes will increase to the inch.

The more closely the table is followed, the more beautiful the finished article.

It is not necessary to give directions for all filet patterns, and so there are but two given in this book, so that all space could be given for extra designs, for the worker who depends entirely upon directions will find that after working out one pattern in the filet lace, they can easily copy thereafter from the design alone.

So few and simple are the stitches in filet, and so effective the finished work, is what has made it so popular.

To begin your piece, first count the meshes in the first row of the design to be copied, and make chain of three times the number of stitches, as there are meshes, plus five to turn with.

Abbreviations and explanations of terms follow:

Ch.—chain. First make a slip knot on the needle and pull a loop through, and repeat until desired length of chain is obtained.

Sl.—Slip stitch. A loop on the hook, pass hook through work and pull loop through both at same time.

D.—Double crochet. Throw thread over needle and pull through two stitches at once, and then over again, and pull through two more.

T.—Treble. Throw thread over needle and take stitch through chain and then thread over and take off two stitches, throw over again, taking off the two remaining stitches.

Dt.—Double treble. Throw thread over needle twice and take off two stitches, then throw thread over again, take off two stitches, and then over again, taking off remaining two stitches.

S.—Space. Make chain of two, and skipping two stitches in original chain, make treble into 4th stitch of chain.

Preface



BOOK on fancy work is often like a book of "simple recipes"—the designs look easy enough in the pictures, but the woman who seeks to develop the intricate patterns soon learns her mistake and puts the book down as impractical. The filet crochet designs presented herein have been prepared especially with a view to simplicity of construction in order that even the novice may succeed. Blocked in solid white against a black ground, they will be found particularly easy of counting.

However, in her desire to assist the amateur, the designer has not forgotten the artist, and the woman who is seeking new and delightful pathways for her needle will be rewarded.

Throughout, the purpose of the book is to give workers in filet crochet harmonious and original patterns, and as its cover designates, to give also designs for their appropriate uses, and one will find them peculiarly adapted to the old colonial furnishings, now so much in vogue.

For example, fruits and flowers are more applicable for table linen than medallions of mice as found in antique patterns, and instead of the Grecian nymphs whose rounded arms did not lend themselves (except in very large pieces) to the square mesh, there are given here the colonial costumes of a most picturesque age. Having abandoned the classical patterns, the designer has substituted, in each case, a pattern that suits the modern home.

For the bathroom, the designs are in keeping with the cool freshness of the wall paper; for the music room, they suggest the songs and instruments of the music lover; and for the nursery, there are the Mother Goose people and other gay things that children love.

There are also some charming Japanese designs of mystic symbols and insignia to be used with the Japanese letters, which alphabet also appears in the book, for the first time in lace, especially attractive for use in the bungalows, the designer having in mind some especial place for every design presented.

The new shadow filet crochet work can be done from these designs, and zephyr, if tightly crocheted, is quite as effective as any good thread, especially in case of baby afghans, as found illustrated in Fig. 86 of this book.




Fig. 2—A tea-rest in a mahogany frame makes a most attractive addition to the colonial sideboard. See Fig. 12.




Fig. 3—A cover for the invalid's tray, or a tea-tray. See Fig. 11.






Fig. 8—This napkin is the newest thing for bridge and porch sets, and measures 11x32 inches. It is part of the luncheon set No. 7. See Anne Orr Cross-stitch Patterns, Set O, and Fig. 78.




Fig. 9—A border and edge used together or separately for a sideboard, buffet, or serving table.

Edge, 13¹/₂ meshes.




Fig. 10—See Fig. 6.




Fig. 11—See Fig. 3.




Fig. 12—See Fig. 2.




Fig. 13—Cover for colonial dresser. See Fig. 14.




Fig. 14—See Fig. 13.




Fig. 15—Border for towel in keeping with bath room decorations, or for a table runner, ecru thread for a room in Dutch designs. See Fig. 23.






Fig. 17—Will fit in Fig. 10.




Fig. 18—Centrepiece to luncheon set.




Fig. 19—Glass doily to luncheon set.




Fig. 20—One-glass tray for the invalid's table or for the guest.






Fig. 22—Plate doily to luncheon set.




Fig. 34—See Fig. 23.




Fig. 25—Counterpane design, illustrated by Fig. 1.




Fig. 26—Medallions for card-table cover and napkins. 29x31 Meshes.




Fig. 27—Pillow sham for bedspread, to be used with Fig. 29. The letters are from Fig. 79.




Fig. 28—Border for bedspread. See Fig. 1.




Fig. 29—A medallion for center of bedspread for the old colonial bed. The border here shown should be duplicated top and bottom of the medallion after crocheting 10 open meshes, and then, with 40 open meshes all around, should again have border on the four sides to complete counterpane. Fig. 27 was designed for the center motif of pillow sham to complete this colonial bed covering.





Fig. 29—A medallion for center of bedspread for the old colonial bed. The border here shown should be duplicated top and bottom four sides to complete counterpane. Fig. 27 was designed for the center motif of pillow sham to compl




Fig. 30. 17x19 Meshes.




Fig. 32—For the little candle table in the colonial bedroom, or for the nursery table.




Fig. 31. 17x19 Meshes.




Fig. 33. 23x24 Meshes.




Fig. 34. 23x29 Meshes.




Fig. 35. 26x24 Meshes.




Fig. 37—Especially for the marking of linens, though attractive for a pillow top or library table or back of a favorite reading chair. Figs. 36, 38 and 39 are Oriental motifs to be used with Japanese alphabet. 59x75 Meshes.




Fig. 38. 22x24 Meshes.




Fig. 39. 21x21 Meshes.




Fig. 40—This peacock is adapted for the library table runner, with the idea of crocheting about 20 open meshes to the right of the bird, and then reversing the pattern. This leaves space between the feet to place a letter and thereby give a more personal interest. Would be attractive also for the motif of a bedspread and pillow shams, or bottom of a door panel or shade.










Fig. 44—See Fig. 45.




Fig. 46—See Fig. 47.

Fig. 49 is a Masonic emblem for pillow top or chair rest.








Fig. 52—For baby's counterpane.














Fig. 59—See Fig. 58.






Fig. 61. Meshes, 14.






Fig. 63. 21x21 Meshes.




Fig. 64. 13x21 Meshes.






Fig. 66. Meshes, 13.












FIG. 77—See FIG. 74.




Fig. 78—Irregular alphabet.








Fig. 81—Shows arrangement of different letters.

For practical use of diamond monograms, follow directions very closely. Either arrange on paper first like Fig. 81 or keep in mind that all outside letters must have two open meshes between them and the triangle at extreme right or left of the diamond, while size of letters must regulate space between center letter and outside letters, as per diagram. If letter in center requires seven meshes instead of five, or the outside letters fill five meshes instead of four, then leave only one open mesh between the center and outside letters instead of two, but in every case leave two meshes between outside letter and little triangle that shapes the diamond.

Stitched down in a diamond or circular shape, the extra crocheted part of square can be cut away and button-holed to a piece of linen, and thus made quite attractive and unusual.




Fig. 82—Shows finished crocheted piece.




Fig. 83—For use of Fig. 83, see Fig. 86.




Fig. 84—For marking linens from Fig. 88.




Fig. 85—For tea table or fudge apron.
