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

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Boy's Raglan Sleeve Pullover

(Shown in Color on Front Cover)

Directions are given for size 12 with sizes 14 and 16 in parentheses. Materials needed are about 12 ounces Brunswick "Loden Heather" 4-ply knitting worsted for sizes 12 and 14, 16 ounces for size 16, 4 ounces Brunswick "Straw Heather" for contrasting color, number 5 and 8 standard knitting needles and 1 set number 8 double pointed needles.

Abbreviations:

MC (main color)

k (knit)

dec (decrease)

tog (together)

CC (contrasting color)

p (purl)

inc (increase)

st (stitch)

sl (slip) psso (pass slip stitch over)

Gauge: 5 sts equal 1 inch
7 rows equal 1 inch

Striped Pattern: 2 rows CC, 2 rows MC, 2 rows CC, 4 rows MC, 4 rows CC, 4 rows MC, 2 rows MC, 2 rows CC.

BACK: With number 5 needles and CC, cast on 82 (88, 90) sts. K 1, p 1 in ribbing for 2½ inches. Fasten off CC, join MC, change to number 8 needles, work in stockinette (k 1 row, p 1 row) for 1½ (2, 3) inches.

Work striped pattern and continue to work in MC until piece measures 12 (12½, 14½) inches or desired length to underarm.

Raglan Shaping: Bind off 2 sts at beginning of next 2 rows. Dec as follows:

Row 1: K 1, k 2 tog, work to last 3 sts, sl 1, k 1, psso, k 1.

Row 2: P.

Continue to dec, repeating rows 1 and 2 until 26 (28, 29) dec's have been made. SI remaining 24 (26, 26) sts onto holder for back of neck.

FRONT: Work same as back to armhole. Start raglan shaping same as on back until 4 dec's have been made—70 (76, 78) sts on needle.

Shape Neck: Continue to work raglan dec's, bind off center 10 (10, 12)

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sts. Join another skein of yarn and work both sides at one time. On k rows, dec 1 st at each neck edge every 6th row 7 (7, 7) times. Continue raglan dec's until no sts are left.

SLEEVES: With number 5 needles and CC, cast on 44 (44, 48) sts. K 1, p 1 in ribbing for 2½ (2½, 3) inches. Fasten off CC and join MC. Change to number 8 needles, work in stockinette to desired length to match stripes on sleeves to front and back pieces. For instance, front and back pieces for size 12 measures 12 inches and sleeve length to armhole measures 13½ inches. Therefore, 1½ inches would be added to sleeve before starting stripe pattern.

After working ribbing for cuff, inc 1 st each end of needle on k rows every inch 8 (9, 10) times. Continue to work in stockinette until sleeve measures 13½ (14, 17½) inches.

Raglan Shaping: Bind off 2 sts at beginning of next 2 rows. Dec same as on back, dec'ing 1 st each end of needle every 4th row 1 (2, 0) times. Continue to dec 1 st each end of needle every k row 25 (25, 30) times. Sl remaining 4 (4, 4) sts onto holder.

Finishing: Sew sleeves to back and front pieces. Sew underarm and sleeve seams. With double pointed needles and MC, right side facing, pick up and k approximately 120 (124, 126) sts around neck edge including sts from all holders. DO NOT PICK UP STS ON BOUND OFF STS AT CENTER FRONT. K 1, p 1 in ribbed rows for 1% (134, 2) inches. At beginning of each of next 14 rows bind off 6(6, 6) sts in ribbing. Bind off remaining sts in ribbing. Pick up and k 1 st in each bound off st around collar, work 3 rows in garter st (k each row). Bind off sts. Work in ends. With right side facing, overlap left collar on right collar, sew to bound off sts at center front. Block. MARY MARTIN



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SNOWMAN FAMILY



To make these cute boutique Snowmen, you need about 4 ounces white, 2 ounces red and 2 ounces green 4-ply yarn; 6 Styrofoam balls, 3 and 4 inches for large snowman, 2½ and 3 inches for medium, 2 and 2½ inches for small and small amounts of black and red felt, number 5 standard knitting needles.

Abbreviations:

k (knit) p (purl) st (stitch) dec (decrease)

tog (together)

NOTE: Cut flat bottom of top ball and small amount off top and bottom of bottom ball. Glue balls together.

LARGE SNOWMAN: With white, cast on 30 sts. Work pattern as follows: Rows 1, 5: K.

D. O. D.

Row 2: P.

Row 3: P to last 3 sts, turn, k back (counts as Row 4). This makes a dec row.

Rows 6, 7, 8: P

Repeat pattern until there are 9 dec sections that fit closely over the snowman's head. Bind off. Sew edges together and pull over two Styrofoam balls.

HAT: With red, cast on 44 sts. Work 5 rows ribbing (k 1, p 1), then stockinette (k 1 row, p 1 row) until piece measures 2½ inches.

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Across next row, k 2 tog, work 3 rows stockinette, one row k 2 tog. Draw up sts. Sew seam. Add pompon.

To Make Pompon: Wind 20 strands yarn over 2-inch cardboard. Tie around center. Cut ends, trim into ball.

SCARF: With green, cast on 50 sts. Work 4 rows seed st (k the p, p the k sts), bind off. Add tassels.

To Make Tassels: Cut four 4-inch lengths green, pull cut ends through half of scarf end, tie. Repeat for second half of scarf end. Repeat on opposite end of scarf. Trim evenly.

MRS. SNOWMAN: With white, cast on 22 sts for body. Work pattern 8 times until there are 8 dec sections. Finish as with large snowman. On dec row, k to last 2 sts, turn.

HAT With red, cast on 34 sts. Work 4 rows ribbing, then stockinette for 2 inches, finish dec and hat as large snowman's hat.

SCARF: With green, cast on 40 sts. Work 2 rows seed st. Bind off. Add tassels, half the size of large snowman's.

BABY SNOWMAN: With white, cast on 16 sts. Work pattern 6 times until there are 6 dec sections. On turn row, work to last 2 sts, turn. Finish as with large snowman.

HAT: With red, cast on 27 sts. Work 3 rows ribbing, then stockinette to 1% inches. Finish dec and hat as large snowman's hat.

SCARF: With green, cast on 35 sts. Work 2 rows seed st. Bind off. Add tassels.

Add faces to snowmen with black felt eyes and red felt mouths, corresponding to snowman's size.



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Sweater and Shoulder Purse



Models are worked in bright colors in a stripe pattern. Both require about 3 ounces color A, 2 ounces each colors B, C and D sportweight yarn, size H crochet hook and 6 buttons. Directions are for size 4 with changes in parentheses for sizes 6 and 8.

Abbreviations:

ch (chain) dec (decrease)
st (stitch) lp (loop)
sc (single crochet) sl (slip)
dc (double crochet) sk (skip)
O (yarn over) sp (space)

Gauge: 5 dcs equal one inch 5 rows equal one inch

NOTE: When changing colors on dc row, join next color yarn before ch 3, turn.

BACK: With color A, ch 11 (13, 15) loosely.

Row 1: Sc in second ch from hook, sc in each ch across, ch 1, turn.

Row 2: Sc in back lp of each sc across, ch 1, turn.

Repeat row 2 until piece measures 13 (14, 15) inches when slightly stretched. Change to color B., ch 1, do not turn.

PATTERN: Dc 1 row, sc 1 row.

Back—Row 1: Working across the long edge of ribbing, sc in end of first 10 • The WORKBASKET

row, * ch 1, sk next row, sc in next end row, repeat from * across, ch 2, turn.

Row 2: Sk first sc, * dc in ch 1 sp of previous row, dc in sc, repeat from * across, ch 1, turn.

Rows 3, 5, 7, and 9: Sc in each st across, ch 2, turn.

Row 4: Sk first st, dc in each sc across, ch 1, turn.

Row 6: Join color C, repeat row 4.

Row 8: Repeat row 4.

Rows 10 through 14: Join color D, repeat rows 6 through 9.

Rows 15 through 19: Join color A, repeat rows 6 through 9.

Rows 20 through 24: Join color B, repeat rows 6 through 9.

Rows 25 through 29: Join color C, repeat rows 6 through 9.

SIZE 6: With color D, work a band (rows 6 through 9) before dec for armholes.

SIZE 8: Work 2 bands (rows 6 through 9) alternating colors D and A before dec for armholes.

Armholes: Join next color, bind off 4 (5, 6) sts at both ends of row. To bind off, sl st loosely across 4 (5, 6) sts; at

end of row leave 4 (5, 6) sts unworked. Dec 1 (2, 3) sts each side every other row 2 (3, 4) times. To dec at beginning of row, draw up lp in next 2 sc, O hook and draw through all lps.

Change colors at appropriate times and continue working in pattern until piece measures 4½ (5, 5½) inches from armhole.

Shape Shoulders: Bind off 5 (6, 7) sts, work across row in pattern to within last 5 (6, 7) sts, turn.

Next Row: Bind off remaining sts.

FRONTS: Ch 11 (13, 15). Work in ribbing same as on back until piece measures 5 (6, 7) inches. Work colors and pattern on front same as back until piece measures same as back to armhole shaping.

Armhole Shaping: Continue to work in pattern with appropriate colors, bind off 4 (5, 6) sts at beginning of row, work across in pattern.

Dec 1 st at armhole edge every other row 2 (3, 4) times, work remainder of row in pattern. Continue until armholes measure 3 (3½, 4) inches ending at armhole edge.

Rounded Neck Shaping: Work across row to last 6 sts, turn. Work in pattern, dec 1 st at neck edge every row 3 (3, 4) times. Work front same as back, ending at neck edge.

Shoulder Shaping—Row 1: Sl st 2 (3, 3) sts, work across.

Row 2: Work across in pattern.

Row 3: Sl st remainder of sts, fasten off. Make second front.

Fold back Short Sleeves: With color A, ch 22 sts. Work ribbing same as on lower edge of back for 28 (30, 32) rows.

Next Row: Join color C, sc each st across.

Shape Cap: Bind off 2 sts each side, continue working in pattern, dec 1 st each side every other row 5 (5, 6) times. Dec 2 sts every row twice. Work 1 row in pattern. Fasten off.

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Finishing: Sew fronts and back together at side and shoulder seams, making sure color stripes match. Sew in sleeves. Fold ribbing on sleeves in half for cuff. Sew on buttons.

Front and Neck Band: Start on lower front edge with right side facing, work 1 sc in each row up front edge, 2 sc at upper corner, 3 sc in each row around neck edge, 2 sc in other upper front corner, sc in each row down opposite front edge,—approximately 135 (139, 143) scs around both fronts and neck edge, ch 1, turn.

Row 2: Sc in each sc around.

Row 3: Sc in each sc around, except on right front. Mark places for desired number of buttonholes. To make buttonholes, ch 3, sk 3, sc in previous row, sc in next sc, continue in this manner down front edge, ch 1, turn.

Next Row: Sc in each sc. Work sc in each ch of each buttonhole, continue around neck edge down other front. Fasten off.

SHOULDER PURSE: With color A and size H hook, ch 30.

Row 1: Sc in each ch, ch 2, turn.

Row 2: Dc in each sc, ch 1, turn.

Row 3: Sc in each dc, ch 2, turn.

Row 4: Repeat Row 2.

Change to color B, repeat four rows.

Change to color C, repeat four rows.

Change to color D, repeat four rows.

Repeat four color stripes until there are 13 stripes or desired number.

Fold purse so that there are 5 stripes on front and approximately 2½ stripes for flap over front. Work 2 rows sc around outside edge, working 2 sc in corners.

Shoulder Strap: Ch st to measure 27 inches or desired length. Sc in 5th ch from hook (lp for joining strap to purse), sc in each ch to within last 5 ch. Sl st in last ch. Sew a button on main part of purse underneath flap. Slip lp on each end of strap over button.

Fringe: Cut fringe 8 inches long. Place one strand of fringe in each sc across lower edge of purse.

Three Grains Bread

(Wheat, oats, and corn combine for a hearty bread.)

3½ to 4 cups all purpose flour

2 cups whole wheat flour 1 cup rolled oats

½ cup wheat germ

1/2 cup yellow corn meal

2 teaspoons salt

2 packages active dry yeast

1 cup hot water

1/4 cup butter or margarine

1 tall can (13 fl. oz.) PET® Evaporated Milk

½ cup honey

1. Stir together 1 cup all purpose flour, whole wheat flour, oats, wheat germ, corn meal, salt and yeast.

2. Combine hot water, butter, evaporated milk, and honey. Stir into flour mixture. Beat 2 minutes on medium speed of electric mixer.

3. Beat in eggs. Beat another 2 minutes on medium speed.

4. Gradually stir in remaining all purpose flour until batter is stiff.

5. Turn out on a lightly floured board. Knead until smooth and elastic. Place dough in greased bowl, cover and let rise until doubled in size.

6. Divide into 2 equal parts. Shape each into loaves. Put into two greased 9-inch loaf pans. Cover and let rise until doubled in

7. Bake at 375°F for 20 minutes. Lower oven temperature to 350°F and bake 30 to 35 minutes longer or until done. TOTAL BAKE TIME: 50 to 55 minutes. Makes 2 loaves. Shown in color photograph

Quick Oyster Stew

(Easy to have for a quick meal.)

2 tablespoons butter or margarine

1/4 cup chopped celery

1 can (8 oz.) ORLEAŃS® Oysters 1 can (10¾ oz.) cream of celery

1 tall can (13 fl. oz.) PET® Evaporated Milk

½ cup water dash pepper

1. Melt butter in 2-quart saucepan. Cook

3. Pour into pie crust. Bake at 350°F for 30 minutes or until center puffs up. Cool before serving. Makes 1, 9-inch pie.

(A combination of four cheeses. Best when allowed to mellow at least a day in the refrigerator.)

- 2 cups (8 oz.) shredded cheddar cheese
- 2 ounces blue cheese, crumbled 1 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 package (3 oz.) cream cheese, softened
- 1/2 teaspoon hot dry mustard 1 small can (5.33 fl. oz.) PET®
- Evaporated Milk (% cup) 1/2 cup chopped FUNSTEN® Walnuts

1. Beat together all ingredients except walnuts. Shape into a ball

2. Roll in walnuts. Wrap with waxed paper. Chill until ready to serve. Serve with crackers. Makes 1 large ball.

- 3 cups mashed sweet potatoes
- tablespoons melted butter or margarine, divided usage
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- small can (5.33 fl. oz.) PET® Evaporated Milk (2/3 cup)
- 1/3 cup raisins
- ½ cup cornflake crumbs
- 1. Mix together sweet potatoes, 3 tablespoons melted butter, cinnamon, salt and evaporated milk.

2. Stir in raisins. Pour into 1½-quart

3. Combine cornflake crumbs and 4 tablespoons melted butter. Spread over top. Bake at 350°F for 40 minutes or until top is slightly browned. Serve hot. Makes 6 servings.

Famous Pumpkin Pie Recipe

(A Thanksgiving favorite!)

2 eggs, slightly beaten can (16 oz.) LIBBY's® Solid Pack Pumpkin

34 cup sugar

½ teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon cinnamon

½ teaspoon ginger

1/4 teaspoon cloves 1 tall can (13 fl. oz.) PET®

Evaporated Milk (9-inch) PET RITZ® Frozen

Deep Dish Pie Crust Shell*

1. Mix filling ingredients in order given. Pour into pie shell. Place pie on cookie sheet.

2. Bake in preheated 425°F oven for 15 minutes. Reduce temperature to 350°F and continue baking for 45 minutes or until knife inserted near center of pie comes out clean. Cool. Serve garnished with whipped topping, if desired. Makes 1, 9-inch pie.

*Note: If PET RITZ® Frozen Regular 9-inch Pie Crust Shells are used, this recipe will fill 2 pie shells. Bake as above, except bake only for 30 minutes at 350°F instead of 45 minutes.

2 eggs 1/4 cup sugar Few grains salt tablespoon vanilla


tall can (13 fl. oz.) PET® **Evaporated Milk, chilled**

3/3 cup cold water

1. Beat eggs until light and fluffy. Gradually beat in sugar, salt, and vanilla. Stir in evaporated milk and water.

2. Serve cold sprinkled with nutmeg or cinnamon. Makes 1 quart.





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Roast Turkey Stuffing

(Make stuffing balls for variety.)

1 cup chopped onion

3 cups diced celery

1/2 cup butter or margarine

2 teaspoons salt

teaspoon pepper

teaspoon sage

1 teaspoon poultry seasoning

12 cups cubed week-old bread 1 cup PET® Evaporated Milk

1. Cook onion and celery in butter until tender. Stir in seasonings. Toss with bread

cubes. Add evaporated milk.

2. Lightly stuff turkey just before placing in oven. Stuffing balls may be formed and baked on a baking sheet in the oven with the turkey. Place balls in oven last 30 minutes that the turkey bakes. Bake 30 minutes or just until browned. Makes 3 quarts stuffing, enough for a 12-14 lb. turkey.

Baking time for turkey in 325°F oven: 10-13 lb. turkey—3-4 hours 14-17 lb. turkey—4-5 hours 18-20 lb. turkey—5½-6½ hours

Gumdrop Bars

(A sweet bar cookie studded with gumdrops.)

2 cups all purpose flour

1 teaspoon cinnamon

1/4 teaspoon salt

3 eggs

2 cups packed brown sugar

1/4 cup PET® Evaporated Milk cup soft gumdrops, cut in

small pieces* 1/2 cup finely chopped FUNSTEN® Pecans

1. Stir together flour, cinnamon, and salt.

2. Beat eggs until light in color. Slowly beat in brown sugar. Stir in evaporated

milk.

3. Add flour mixture a third at a time, beating until smooth after each addition. Stir in gumdrops and pecans. Spread into greased 13x9x2-inch baking pan. Bake at 325°F for 35 minutes or until lightly browned and bar pulls from sides of pan. Cool. Spread with creamy Vanilla Frosting and cut into bars. Makes 32 bars.

*Omit licorice-flavored gumdrops.

Creamy Vanilla Frosting

(A versatile creamy vanilla frosting.)

1/2 cup butter or margarine, softened

1/4 cup PET® Evaporated Milk

2 teaspoons vanilla 1 pound powdered sugar (4 cups)

1. Combine butter, evaporated milk, and vanilla in 1½-quart mixing bowl.

2. Add powdered sugar, 1 cup at a time, mixing until smooth after each addition. Mix until frosting is smooth and shiny. If consistency is too thick, add a few drops of evaporated milk. Spread on cooled Gumdrop Bars or use over cakes. Makes 134 cups frosting; enough for 9-inch layer cake, 48 cupcakes, or a 13x9x2-inch sheet cake.

Garden Eggplant

(Quick and delicious!

4 tablespoons butter or margarine

2 medium onions, sliced

cup sliced celery

2 medium eggplants, peeled and cut into 1-inch cubes

1 cup chopped green pepper

21/2 teaspoons salt

2 teaspoons paprika

2 tablespoons flour

tall can (13 fl. oz.) PET® Evaporated Milk

1. Melt butter in large saucepan. Stir in onions and celery. Cook over medium heat until onions are limp.

2. Stir into saucepan eggplant and green pepper. Cover. Cook over medium heat for 10 to 15 minutes, stirring occasionally, until

eggplant is tender.

3. Combine salt, paprika and flour. Sprinkle over vegetables. Pour over evaporated milk. Stir gently. Cook to boiling. Boil 1 minute. Serve hot. Makes 8 servings, about ½ cup each.

Spice Cookies

(A rolled cookie that is spiced!)

3 cups all purpose flour

4 teaspoons baking powder

2 teaspoons cinnamon

1 teaspoon salt

3/3 cup butter or margarine, softened

11/2 cups sugar

1 small can (5.33 fl. oz.) PET® Evaporated Milk (¾ cup)

1. Stir together flour, baking powder, cin-

namon and salt.

2. Beat butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Mix in one-third of flour mixture. Stir in half of evaporated milk. Repeat, ending with the addition of flour mixture. Cover and chill for 3 hours.

3. Turn onto floured board. Roll 1/4-inch thick. Cut into shapes with cookie cutters. Place on greased cookie sheet. Bake at 375°F for 10 minutes or until lightly browned. Remove to cooling racks. Cool completely before storing in air-tight containers. Makes 8 dozen cookies.

Beef Pie with Cheese Topping

- 2 tablespoons shortening
- 2 tablespoons minced onion
- 34 pound ground beef
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- 1/8 teaspoon oregano
- 2 tablespoons flour
- cups stewed tomatoes
- cup cooked cubed carrots

1 cup cooked green peas Melt shortening, add onions, meat, salt and pepper. Brown. Add tomatoes, flour and oregano, cook until thickened. Add cooked carrots and peas, pour into greased casserole.

Topping

- 1 cup flour
- 11/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons margarine
- 1/4 cup grated cheese
- ½ cup milk

Blend all ingredients to make soft dough. Pour topping over meat mixture, spread evenly with spatula. Bake at 350° for 25 minutes. Serves 6.

Pizza Meat Patties

1/2 pound ground pork

- pound ground beef
- teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
 1 cup finely chopped onion
- 1/2 cup minced parsley
- 1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese

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Rnd 1: Join ball and shuttle threads to p of center, * ch 5 ds, p, 4 ds, join in next long p, ch 4 ds, p, 5 ds, join in next p, repeat from * around, join last ch at base of first ch. Tie and cut threads.

Rnd 2: R of 6 ds, join in p of last ch, 6 ds, cl r. R of 6 ds, join in p of next ch, 6 ds, cl r, rw. * Ch 4 ds, p, 4 ds, long p, 4 ds, p, 4 ds, join in joining over long p, ch 4 ds, p, 4 ds, long p, 4 ds, p, 4 ds, rw. R of 6 ds, join in p of ch in previous rnd, 6 ds, cl r. R of 6 ds, join in p of next ch, 6 ds, cl r, rw, repeat from * twice, end with

ch as before, join last ch at base of first r. Tie and cut threads.

Rnd 3: Join ball and shuttle threads in last p, * ch 4 ds, p, 4 ds, join in next p, ch 5 ds, join in long p, ch 5 ds, join in next p, repeat from * around, join last ch at base of first ch. Tie and cut threads.

Rnd 4: * R of 6 ds, join in joining over long p, 6 ds, cl r, rw. Ch 6 ds, p, 6 ds, rw. R of 6 ds, join in same joining, 6 ds, cl r, rw. Ch 1 ds, p, 5 ds, p, 7 ds, join in next p of previous rnd, ch 7 ds, p, 5 ds, p, 1 ds, rw, repeat from * around, join last ch at base of first r. Tie and cut threads.

Rnd 5: Join ball and shuttle threads in p of ch between rs, * ch 5 ds, 4 p sep by 3 ds, 3 ds, 6 ds, p, 6 ds, join in second p of next ch in previous rnd, ch 5 ds, join in first p of next ch, ch 5 ds, join in last p of last ch, 6 ds, 4 p sep by 3 ds, 5 ds, join in p of ch between rs, repeat from * around, join last ch at base of first ch. Tie and cut threads.

Rnd 6: * R of 5 ds, join in 4th p of ch in previous rnd, 5 ds, cl r, rw. Make a ch of ds, ¾ inch long (pulled tight), p, ¾ length of ds, twist ch, join at base of ch—make 3 chs in this manner. R of 5 ds, join in first p of next ch, 5 ds, cl r, rw. Ch 15 ds, p, 3 ds, p, 9 ds, join in 3rd p of same ch, 9 ds, join in first p of next ch, ch 9 ds, join in last p of last ch, 3 ds, p, 15 ds, rw.

Rnd 7: R of 6 ds, join in free p of last ch in previous rnd, 6 ds, cl r, rw. * Ch 3 ds, p, 3 ds, join in p of next twisted ch, (ch 2 ds, 6 p sep by 2 ds, 2 ds, join in p of next twisted ch) twice. Ch 3 ds, p, 3 ds, rw. R of 6 ds, join in free p of next ch, 6 ds, cl r, rw. Ch 3 ds, 3 p sep by 3 ds, 3 ds, rw. R of 6 ds, join in free p of next ch, 6 ds, cl r, rw, repeat from * around, join last ch at base of first r. Tie and cut threads.

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Long Legged Clown



To make this darling, soft toy clown, you need about 4 ounces white, 4 ounces each green and yellow (or any two colors desired), small amounts of orange, red and black 4-ply worsted weight yarn, size J crochet hook, ample stuffing, felt and glue for face.

Note: With these materials, you will have enough to make two dolls or more. This pattern is worked in continuous rounds. DO NOT CH AND TURN.

Abbreviations:

ch (chain) sl (slip)
sc (single crochet) sl st (slip stitch)
rnd (round) lp (loop)
st (stitch) sk (skip)

Head: Using white, ch 4, sl st in first ch. (Always use top lp of every st throughout pattern.) Use marker to show beginning of rnds.

Rnds 1, 2: 2 sc in each st.

Rnd 3: * Sc in next st, 2 sc in next st, continue from * around.

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Rnds 4, 5, 6: Sc in each st around. Rnd 7: Sc in next 2 sts, * sk 1 st, sc in next 2 sts, continue from * around.

Rnd 8: Sc in every other st. Fasten off.

Body—Rnd 1: Using green, 2 sc in every st.

Rnd 2: * Sc in next 2 sts, 2 sc in next st. Continue from * around.

Rnds 3 through 11: Sc in every st. Stuff.

Rnd 12: Sl st in every other st until body opening is closed. Fasten off.

Body Trim: Using green, sl st sc into body at bottom edge of middle back. Ch 3,* sc in next st, ch 2. Continue from * to middle front. Doing same st, go up front of body and around neck halfway. Fasten off. Start again at neck with yellow doing same st other half of neck, back to front of body, down body. Continue around bottom edge to join. Fasten off.

Nose: Using red, place nose straight above body double row of trim in center of face. Sl st sc into head, sc 4 times in small circle. Sl st every other st. Fasten off. Tie 2 ends together, tuck in head.

Arms: Using green for one arm, yellow for other arm, sl st sc into first row of body on side after head, 4 sc down body.

Rnd 1: Sc in each of the top of the 5 sc lps, continue 1 sc in each of bottom 5 sc lps—10 sc.

Rnds 2 through 6: Sc in each st.

Trim on Cuffs: Using color of sleeve, ch 2, * sc in next st, ch 1, continue from * around. Fasten off.

Hands: Using white, continue sc in each st for 3 rnds, stuff.

Rnd 4: Work sl st in every other st

until hand is closed. Repeat from start to finish for other arm and hand.

Legs: Using green for one leg, yellow for other, sl st sc on bottom of body right under trim, then 4 sc.

Rnd 1: Sc in each of top of 5 sc lps, continue sc in each of bottom 5 sc lps—10 sc.

Rnds 2 through 16: Sc in every st.

Trim on Legs: Ch 2, * sc in next st, ch 1, continue from * around. Fasten off

Shoes—Rnd 1: Using black, 2 sc in next 5 sts, sc in next 5 sts.

Rnd 2: Sc in next st, 2 sc in next 3 sts, sc in next 6 sts.

Rnd 3: Sc in every st. Stuff.

Rnd 4: Sl st every other st until shoe is closed. Repeat from start to finish for other leg and shoe.

Hair: Using orange, sl st sc just above forehead, ch 3, sc in next st, ch 2,

sc in next st. Continue for hair line around head. Fasten off.

Hat; Using green, ch 4, sl st in first ch.

Rnd 1: 2 sc in each st.

Rnds 2, 3: Sc in next st, 2 sc in next st, repeat around.

Rnds 4, 5: Sc in every st.

Rnds 6, 7: Sc in next two sts, 2 sc in next st, repeat around.

Rnds 8, 9, 10: Sc in every st. Fasten off. Using yellow, ch 3, * sc in next st, ch 2, continue from * around. Fasten off, leaving long enough piece to sew hat on. Make small pompon in yellow for top of hat. Tuck all ends.

To Make Pompon: Wind 20 strands of yarn over a small piece of cardboard, tie around center, cut ends and trim into ball.

Cut face out of felt and glue on. If you wish, you can sew hands together so clown can hold his knees, or hang.

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


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Cosmetic Case



To make this handy cosmetic case, you need a 13 x 7 inch piece of corduroy, velveteen or whatever type material desired, a 13 x 7 inch piece of lining material, felt scraps for applique, pocket comb and small mirror, adhesive Pellon, 1 snap fastener, small amount of gold braid.

Use lightweight cardboard for all pattern pieces. Lay case pattern on adhesive Pellon, trace around and cut out. Iron Pellon piece to wrong side of material. Cut fabric ¼ inch outside Pellon edges. Mark vertical center line and BOTH fold lines in thread. Pin to piece of lining material, right sides in with Pellon on top. Stitch edges together just outside Pellon, leaving open on one side between fold lines. Cut lining edges even with material. Turn right side out, slipstitch opening to-

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

gether and press. Stitch on fold lines.



Cut a piece of Pellon slightly smaller than bottom section, pin over lining, stitch around. Add several rows of stitching % inch apart.

Cut adhesive Pellon pieces for comb and mirror cases. The size of mirror case will vary according to size and shape of mirror used. It should be cut about ½ inch wider than mirror and cover ¾ of its height. Iron Pellon pieces to a piece of felt and cut felt edges even with Pellon. Trim upper edge of mirror case with gold braid. Stitch several lines on both pieces for reenforcement. Stitch comb case to outside of bottom section as indicated on pattern, mirror case to inside (over lining) of middle section, upper edge ¾ inch below fold line, centers matched.

Mark outline of applique design on outside of top section. Iron Pellon to small scraps of felt, lay design patterns on top, trace around and cut out pieces. Apply a little white glue to back before placing design according to outline.

Let dry. Sew around design by hand or stitch on machine, using small zigzag stitch.

Attach snap fastener parts to top and bottom section following directions on package.

Turn up bottom section on foldline and stitch edges together ½ inch from edge. Continue stitching around edge of top section.

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Christmas Card Lanterns

Christmas cards are really too pretty to throw away when the holiday season is over. Many of us end up putting them on the shelf in a box or tucking them away in a drawer and that's probably where they remain to be discarded at some far distant future time in a housecleaning spree. But last year's cards have potential for this year's use in a number of different ways. One is in making Christmas lanterns to use as tree decorations.



Completed Card Lanterns

Choose stiff cards for the square lanterns. The picture part which will make the lantern must be at least 6 inches x 2½ inches. The diagram is for a card of these dimensions with the ½ inch flap for gluing together outside the picture area. Cut off the card back and discard it. Lay out the diagram in pencil across the picture.

Use a straight edge ruler and a felt tip marker for outlining the "panes" on four sides of lantern—Photograph 1.

Trim off any excess paper around lantern. Make cuts below frame outline as indicated in diagram to make four

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
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

flaps that will be folded over each other and glued together to make lantern bottom. Use a straight edge ruler and a blunt knife to make a crease along all dotted lines, then fold along these lines. Glue 1/8-inch wide flap at right end of lantern frame under edge of left "pane" to close lantern square. Fold four bottom flaps one on top of another and glue to close bottom—Photograph 2.






To make pattern for lantern top, lay out a 3-inch diameter circle on piece of scrap paper. Lay out a hexagon within circle. Draw lines from point to point to divide hexagon into triangle sections. Cut out hexagon and cut away one triangle section, this is lantern top pat-

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tern shown in Figure 2. Cut top of black construction paper. Crease along dotted lines and fold. Glue flap A to flap B to make four-sided top.

Thread a darning needle with gold thread or colored crochet cotton, pull two ends even and knot end of doubled thread. Push needle through center of lantern bottom and pull thread through until knot is against bottom. Push needle through point of lantern top from inside. Run a line of glue around top rim of lantern frame and pull thread on through until lantern top is down against frame, set aside to dry. When top is glued to frame, knot thread above peak of top and work knot down against peak. Several inches above, tie a second knot to form






Square lanter hanging loop. Cut off excess thread above top knot.


Use an empty large size sewing thread spool as a core for round lantern. From a suitable picture card, cut a section wide enough to reach from top to bottom of spool and long enough to wrap around spool and lap about ¼ inch. We used a snowy scene of bringing home Christmas tree, any subject can be used for this one. To make picture section easier to wrap around spool, draw paper across a knife blade exerting light pressure to make paper curl. Spread glue around edges of top and bottom spool rim and wrap picture around spool, glue lap edge.

Cut a circle of paper to fit bottom of spool and glue it in place. Cut a 2-inch circle of black or colored construction paper for top, make a cut from edge to center. Lap and glue as indicated in Figure 3 to make conical top.

Make a tassel of colored crochet. Fasten tassel to doubled crochet thread threaded in a darning needle. Push needle through center of bottom and up through hole in spool and through point of lantern top from inside. Spread glue along top edge of spool and bring top down to glue against spool. Knot thread against outside peak of top several inches higher to make hanging loop.



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My aloe plant has grown much too tall and out of proportion. Can you tell me if it can be propagated by air layering? Mrs. M.A.P., TN

Aloe plants are propagated by breaking off the small young plants coming up around the parent plant. If you tried to air layer an aloe, the leaf would probably rot and die.

We transplanted 12 peonies 2½ years ago. This year three bloomed and the rest have never bloomed since. Do they need special food? Mrs. C. D., WI

You may be expecting results too soon, depending on size of plant planted. To give them a boost, work five or six tablespoonsfuls of bonemeal into the soil around the edge of the plant in spring just as the shoots are breaking the surface. This should produce spectacular results. Reapply each year.

Can you tell me what to do for my crapemyrtle? It is about 5 years old. It bloomed well for 2 years. The last 2 years it just blooms at the top of the longest branches. The rest of the tree is full of foliage, but has no buds. The foliage is dark green and looks healthy. Mrs. M. R., OK

Grow crape-myrtle in the warmest, sunniest situation. Cut back in the spring to strong growing shoots about five or six inches above the ground. By early fall, they should bloom.

I have been given two cineraria plants in bloom. What care do I take of them after they are through blooming? I. C., MN

Cineraria are short-lived plants in a warm room. They are grown at 40° to 45° F, never above 50° F. When through blooming, discard. They don't like summer weather. They are florist plants that rarely last more than 2 to 3 weeks in the average house.

My mums grow up fine. They bud and then the bud rots instead of blooming. What is wrong? Is there anything I can do to prevent this? Mrs. M.A.T., IN

Chrysanthemum buds that fail to develop or rot need to be sprayed with zineb or captan.

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I would like to know why buds drop off cactus plants. The buds are large and show color, then drop off before they bloom. Mrs. L. R. B., MD

Dropping of unopened flower buds may be caused by any of several reasons: a sudden rise or fall in temperature, change in light intensity or direction or simply that the plant is producing more blossoms than it can support.

I would like to know if blueberries will grow in Ventura? If so, what varieties will grow the best here? Mrs. A. C. C., CA

In some California areas they should grow well, but seldom do. If you have moist climate and cool winter, write any Eastern nursery specializing in the new types and try their recommendations.

Several months ago I purchased an iron cross begonia, but it is not doing well. Can you give me some advice as to how to care for it? Mrs. M. U., OH

Soil should be humusy but porous; temperature not below 55° F. A humid atmosphere suits these plants best.

How do I get rid of red spiders on my impatiens (Sultana)? They only have that problem when I bring them in the house. Mrs. J. C. L., MI


Red spiders are controlled by spraying with Kelthane, Omite, Tedion, Malathion or an aerosol plant bomb.

I would like to know what causes dry rot on my yellow non-acid tomatoes. They do not touch the ground. Mrs. C. S., NY

The rotting is called blossom end rot, a problem resulting from calcium deficiency and irregular water. Some tomato varieties are particularly sensitive. The solution is proper soil (not too acid) and amply moist soil during the growing season. Mulching in summer helps, provided the plants are well watered in droughts.

Growing House Plants From Cuttings



Propagating plants is a most exciting and rewarding adventure. When you work with cuttings (slips) you feel like a magician. Take a small piece from an old plant, put it through a few simple procedures, and you have a new plant that is a duplicate of the original!

Cuttings of some plants will root in water. They are the best ones for beginners. Some of the easiest to handle by this method are Wandering Jew, coleus, ivy and philodendron. They will start in ordinary tap water, but prefer rain water. Avoid water that is chemically softened. For containers, some hobbyists use clear glass, while others think they get better results in colored glass. Pottery may also be used.

A more dependable method for propagating most plants is to use a soil-like medium with special qualities that aid rooting process. Ideally, this medium should be sterile and moisture and air retentive. Several good materials are available. Choose from sphagnum peat moss, clean coarse sand, perlite, vermiculite, or a combination of any or all of these. A good combination is sphagnum peat moss with some perlite or sand mixed in. Moisten medium thoroughly before use. Fertilizer isn't

needed until plants have started to grow.

Plants usually rooted in a soil-like medium include begonia, coleus, crown-of-thorns, dracaena, geranium, grape-ivy, impatiens, ivy, nepthytis, philodendron, rubber plant and waxplant.

A typical stem cutting is the leafy tip growth from a vigorous, stocky and healthy shoot. Avoid hard old stems or weak straggly growth. Each cutting should be three to five inches long with several leaves. Make the removal-cut about 4 inch below a leaf. Foliage is important for nourishing root's development; however, leaves just above cut should be snipped off so they won't be beneath soil or water. If cut end of stem is sappy, as with begonia and geranium, it should be allowed to dry off and seal itself before being placed in rooting medium. This may take an hour or overnight. Leaves must be kept from wilting through this period; cover them with a polyethylene bag.

Insert about \(\frac{1}{3} \) of cutting length (or 1 to 2 inches) into rooting medium, which should be at room temperature and moist, but not soggy.

Leaf cuttings seem even more amazing than stem cuttings. They work splendidly with some familiar house plants.

Some succulents, such as jade plant and sedum, have plump leaves which can be removed individually and tucked, stem-end down, into surface of rooting medium. Tiny plants will develop at that end.

African violet, rex begonias, gloxinia and peperomis leaves, cut with about an inch of their leaf-stem (petiole), will root and produce new plantlets at the base of the stem when placed in either water or a soil-like medium.

Philodendron and pothos vines can be cut into many segments, each carrying one leaf with stem plus a short piece of main branch to which it is attached. New shoots are sent from spot where stem and branch join (node). Root either in rooting medium or water.

Snake plant or mother-in-law's tongue (Sansevieria) leaves can be cut into three-inch segments, allowed to dry a few hours, and set upright in soil medium.

All cuttings will root most rapidly when atmosphere is constantly humid, with conditions similar to a greenhouse. Some hobbyists turn glass jars over individual cuttings. Some use old aquariums or large glass jars with covers. One solution is to place a polyethylene bag over low containers housing one or many cuttings. Always use a new bag because soiled ones might be harboring disease organisms. Polyethylene lets air in, but keeps moisture from escaping; no additional watering may be needed until plants have rooted. Check occasionally.

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The best temperature is 70° to 75°, and good location is in bright light but not direct sun.

Roots appear within a week on some plants, but many need a month to six weeks. Usually when new leaf growth appears, it is a sign that roots have started.

Help new plants adjust to outside atmosphere by opening their enclosure for a while every day.

When roots are from ½ inch to 1 inch long, transplant to regular potting soil. For best results, cover plants with polyethylene again for a few hours each day. Why not start some cuttings today?

Trailing Plants


Versatile trailing plants are a must for every home. One type is the variegated Wandering Jew with bright, attractive green and cream candy-striped leaves. Another, Wandering Jew, is a glowing purple beneath broad silver bands of fleshy leaves.

This variety of plant is fast growing and puts out roots wherever the plant touches soil or water. Wandering Jew needs average temperatures.

Soil for the variegated type can dry out between waterings. Soil for the purple variety should be kept uniformly moist, but not wet. Do not overwater either variety.

Avoid strong sun for various types of Wandering Jew although they prefer a light position and diffused light, preferably with humid air. Their trailing specimens are good for hanging baskets, windowsills, wall brackets or shelves. Use fertilizer according to package directions.

Decorative Muffler



Many combinations of colors would be delightful for this muffler. To make model in original colors you need about 3½ ounces yellow, 2½ ounces dark blue and size G plastic crochet hook.

Abbreviations:

ch (chain) sl st (slip stitch) sc (single crochet)
dc (double crochet)

First Shell Strip: With yellow, ch 8, sl st in first ch to form ring. Ch 3, 7 dc over ch of ring. * Ch 5, do not turn work, sc in 4th dc from base of ch, ch 3, 7 dc over ch 5 just made, repeat from * until 40 shells have been completed, ending with ch 5, sl st in 4th dc from last ch 5, fasten off.

Second Shell Strip: With blue, ch 4, sc in top of first ch 3 in yellow strip, ch 4, sl st in first st of first ch 4 to form ring. Ch 3, 7 dc over ch of ring. * Sc in top of ch 3 of next shell of yellow strip, ch 5, do not turn work, sc in 4th dc from base of ch, ch 3, 7 dc over ch 5 just made, repeat from * until 40 shells have been completed, ending with ch 5, sl st in 4th dc from last ch 5, fasten off.

Continue making alternating strips until there are 3 yellow and 2 blue.

Fringe: Cut five 8-inch lengths of yarn (fringe matches color of strip). Fold five lengths of yarn in half, pull fold through center of ring of beginning.

shell, pick up loose ends of yarn and pull through fold, pull tight against ring. Trim ends even.

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

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Angelic Tabard



Delight your little angel with this tabard made of 4-ply worsted weight acrylic yarn. Model takes about 6 ounces for small size, 8 ounces for large size. Angel decoration requires mohair type yarn, ½ ounce each in yellow and white, and a scrap of pink, blue and red for face. Directions are given for small (4-6) with large size in parentheses. Use number 7 standard knitting needles and size G crochet hook.

Abbreviations:

k (knit) p (purl)
st (stitch) ch (chain)
sc (single crochet) rnd (round)
inc (increase) dec (decrease)

Gauge: 5 sts equal one inch 7 rows equal one inch

Pattern Stitch: (Multiple of 4 plus 3) Row 1: K_.1, * p 1, k 3, repeat from * to last 2 sts, p 1, k 1.

Rows 2, 4: P.

Row 3: K 3, * p 1, k 3, repeat from * to end of row.

BACK and FRONT are made alike. Cast on 59 (71) sts. Work in garter st (k each row) for 1¼ (1½) inches.

Keeping first and last 8 sts in garter st, work in pattern on 43 (55) center sts until piece measures 10% (11%) inches from beginning. End on right side. Work 1% inches garter st. End on wrong side.

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Neck: K 18 (20) sts. Bind off center 23 (31) sts for neck. K to end of row.

Next Row: K across 18 (20) sts, join another ball of yarn to other side, k rest of row. K both sides at once until piece measures 16 (18) inches from beginning, keeping shoulders of tabard in garter st as established.

Shoulder: Working both sides at once, (small) bind off 5 sts at beginning of next 4 rows, then 4 sts at beginning of next 4 rows, (large) bind off 5 sts at beginning of next 8 rows. Sew shoulder seams.

Ties: (Make 8) With two strands of yarn, crochet ch 10 (12) inches (or desired length) long. Sew on, 8 (12) inches down on both sides.

Crochet Angel—Head: With pink, ch 2. Work 6 sc in 2nd ch from hook. Mark for beginning of each rnd.

Rnd 1: 2 Sc in each sc around.

Rnd 2: 2 Sc in next sc, sc in next sc around.

Rnd 3: 2 Sc in next sc, sc in next 2 sc around, fasten off.

Dress: With white, ch 5, turn. Ch 1 to turn each row, sc in 4 sts. Inc 1 st each end every 4th row 3 times—10 sc. Inc 1 st each end every other row 5 times—20 sc. Work 2 rows even, fasten off. Sc around whole piece, working 3 sc in each corner.

Wings: (Make two) With yellow, ch 15, turn, sc 14. Ch 1 to turn each row. Dec 1 st each end every other row until 8 sts remain. Sc around as for dress.

Hair: With 2 strands of yellow, satin stitch around head in ridge from last rnd of crochet, leaving empty section for neck. Keep sts even and untwisted. Satin stitch across forehead for bangs.

Eyes and Mouth: Make 2 blue French knots (wrap needle 3 times) for eyes and one red one for mouth.


Sew head and wings to dress. Sew to tabard, block.

Ribbon Christmas Ornaments

Delightful Christmas tree ornaments that are fun to make and easy on the budget. Materials needed are fused ribbon (a different color on each side), narrow and wide sizes, small beads or pearls and bells.




To make the heart ornament, use ½ yard fused ribbon. Cut an 8-inch, a 6-inch and a 4-inch length. Fold at center of each length, placing the three lengths together at fold. Place a pearl on needle, stitch through fold and place another pearl, secure thread. Bringing ribbon ends together, secure with another stitch, trim ends.



The large flower requires 42½ inches fused wide ribbon, small flower 28½ inches fused narrow ribbon and 7 pearls for center. Fold ribbon under ¼ inch at each end, marking every 6 inches for large flower, every 4 inches for small flower. Stitch ribbon ends together, fold at each mark. Insert nee-

dle, placing a pearl between each fold, draw thread tight, forming flower. Secure thread ends.



Ribbon candy ornament requires one yard fused ribbon, one 1½-inch bell ornament and 5 small beads or pearls. Mark ribbon in 4-inch lengths, sew bell to one end. Looping ribbon from right to left 4 times, place a pearl between each loop, making sure marks are in center, insert needle through each mark and pearl. Draw thread tight and secure end thread.



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

Square Crochet Doily



This doily will measure approximately 11½ inches square when completed. Materials needed are about 2 balls J. & P. Coats "Big Ball" size 30 Mercerized Crochet Thread, size 10 Susan Bates steel crochet hook.

Abbreviations:

ch (chain) p (picot)
st (stitch) sl (slip)
dc (double crochet) sc (single crochet)
sk (skip) rnd (round)
lp (loop)

FIRST MOTIF: Starting at center, ch 5, join with sl st to form ring.

Rnd 1: Ch 3, 15 dc in ring, join to top of ch 3.

Rnd 2: Ch 1, sc in joining, * ch 1, sk next dc, (3 dc, ch 3, 3 dc) in next dc, ch 1, sk next dc, sc in next dc, repeat from * around, end with ch 1, join to first sc.

Rnd 3: Ch 1, sc in joining, * ch 5, sk next 3 dc, (dc, ch 5, dc) in next lp—corner lp made, ch 5, sk next 3 dc, sc in next sc, repeat from * around, end with ch 5, join to first sc, fasten off.

SECOND MOTIF: Work exactly as for first motif until rnd 2 has been completed.

Rnd 3: Ch 1, sc in joining, ch 5, sk next 3 dc. Join 2 motifs along one side 40 • The WORKBASKET


as follows: Dc in next lp on 2nd motif, ch 2, sl st in any corner lp on first motif, ch 2, dc in same lp on 2nd motif, ch 2, sl st in next lp on first motif, ch 2, sk next 3 dc on 2nd motif, sc in next sc, ch 2, sl st in next lp on first motif, ch 2, dc in next lp on 2nd motif, ch 2, sl st in next corner lp on first motif, ch 2, dc in same lp on 2nd motif. Working on 2nd motif only, (ch 5, sk next 3 dc, sc in next sc, ch 5, sk next 3 dc, in next lp make dc, ch 5, dc) twice, ch 5, join. Fasten off.


Continue to make second motif, joining motifs as shown on diagram. Where 4 corners meet, join corners to previous joinings.

EDGING: Join thread to the ch 5 lp before any of 4 corner motifs.

In same lp make (2 sc, ch 3, sc in 3rd ch from hook—p made) twice, 2 sc in next ch 2 sp, ** working along the 3 sides of next corner motif, make 2 sc in next ch 2 sp, p, in each of next 8 ch 5 lps make (2 sc, p) twice, 2 sc in next ch 2 sp, * 2 sc in next ch 2 sp, p, in each of next 5 ch 5 lps make (2 sc, p) twice, 2 sc in next 2 sp, repeat from * across to next corner motif, repeat from ** around. Join last p to first sc. Fasten off.

Starch lightly and press.





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


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
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

Hooded Stadium Jacket

(Shown in Color on Page 49)

Instructions are for size 38-40. Changes for size 42-44 are in parentheses. You need about 32 (36) ounces Bucilla Spice 3-ply knitting worsted weight yarn, numbers 8 and 10 standard knitting needles (or sizes needed to obtain gauge), size I crochet hook and stitch holders.

Abbreviations:

k (knit) inc (increase)
p (purl) tog (together)
sl (slip) ch (chain)
st (stitch) inc (increase)

lp (loop)

Gauge: 3 sts equal 1 inch 9 rows equal 2 inches

Measurements:

Bustline buttoned—40 (44) inches Back at Underarm—20 (22) inches

Seed St Pattern: (On uneven number of sts)—Row 1: K 1, p 1 across.

Row 2: Same as row 1.

NOTE: If row ends k 1, the next row will begin k 1 or vice versa.

BACK: With number 8 needles, cast on 59 (65) sts. Work stockinette (p 1 row, k 1 row) for 8 rows for hem. End with k row.

Next Row: K in back lp of each st for turning ridge. Change to number 10 needles. Work stockinette (k 1 row, p 1 row) until 22 inches above turning ridge, or desired length to underarm. End wrong side.

YOKE—Row 1: K 1, * p 1, k 1. Repeat from * across. Repeat row 1 for seed st for 8 inches. End wrong side.

NECK AND SHOULDER SHAPING: Work first 21 (23) sts in pattern, sl to holder for right back, bind off next 17 (19) sts for neck. Work remaining 21 (23) sts for left back. Bind off 7 (8) sts at armhole edge. Work to within 2 sts of end, k 2 sts tog.

Next Row: Work even in pattern. Repeat last 2 rows once. Bind off remaining 5 sts. From wrong side, sl sts from holder to needle, join yarn at neck edge. Work to correspond to left back.

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RIGHT FRONT: With number 8 needles, cast on 35 (39) sts. Work hem and turning ridge same as for back. Change to number 10 needles.

Row 1: K 1, * p 1, k 1. Repeat from * 3 times for seed st border, k to end.

Row 2: P to within last 9 sts, k 1, * p 1, k 1. Repeat from * to end.

Keeping first 9 sts in seed st and remaining sts in stockinette, work even until 6½ inches above turning ridge, end wrong side.

POCKET OPENING: Work 19 (21) sts and sl to holder for front. Do not break yarn. With free needle and second ball of yarn, cast on 13 sts for pocket lining. With same needle, k remaining 16 (18) sts—29 (31) sts. Work even for 31 rows (about 7 inches). End at side edge.

Next Row: P 16 (18) sts, sl to holder, bind off 13 sts of pocket lining. Sl 19 (21) sts of front from holder to needle. With attached ball of yarn, work 33 rows, end at pocket edge.

Sl sts from holder to free needle and work these sts—35 (39) sts. Work until same as back to underarm.

Work seed st pattern for 8 inches.

At armhole edge, bind off 7 (8) sts twice, 5 sts once, work to end—16 (18) sts.

Shape Hood: Keeping pattern, work 16 (18) sts, cast on 11 (9) sts—27 sts. Mark for inside edge. Work 2 rows.

Next Row (Inc row): Inc 1 st in first st, work to end. Working seed st, repeat inc every 4th row once, then every 6th row twice—31 sts.

Work even in pattern until hood measures 10 inches from beginning. At inside edge, k 2 sts tog at beginning of every second row until hood measures 13 inches from beginning—25 sts. Bind off

LEFT FRONT: With number 8 needles, cast on 35 (39) sts. Work hem and turning ridge same as for back. Change

to number 10 needles.

Row 1: K to within 9 sts of end, work seed st to end.

Row 2: Work seed st for 9 sts, p to end. Repeat these 2 rows for 6½ inches above turning ridge. End right side.

Next Row: Work 19 (21) sts and sl to holder for front. Do not break yarn. With free needle and second ball of yarn, cast on 13 sts for pocket lining. With same needle, p remaining sts. Complete to correspond to right front, reversing shaping.


Pocket Borders: With number 10 needles, right side facing and beginning at lower edge of left front pocket opening, pick up and k 23 sts along edge. Work seed st for 5 rows. Bind off in pattern. Work right front pocket border same, beginning at upper edge.

SLEEVES: With number 10 needles, cast on 41 (43) sts. Work seed st for 9 inches. With care to keep pattern, inc 1 st each side—43 (45) sts. Repeat

inc every 3 inches 3 times-49 (51) sts. Work even until 21 inches from beginning. Bind off in pattern.

Finishing: Sew pocket linings in place on inside of jacket. Tack top and bottom pocket edges in place. Sew shoulders. Sew top and back seam of hood. Center back seam of hood to center back of neck. Sew hood to neck edge. Sew in sleeves, matching pattern. Sew side and sleeve seams, reversing sewing 4 inches from bottom for cuffs. Turn back cuffs. Hem lower edge. Sew on toggle buttons as shown.

Frogs: (Make four.) With crochet hook, ch 33 sts, work 1 sl st in each st of ch, join with sl st in first sl st, forming ring. Fasten off. Sew inner edges of ring together leaving about 1 inch lp at each end free for toggle buttons. Tack right half of frog to right front. Turn back ends 2 inches. Sew to ch to form lp as shown. Steam lightly.



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
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
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

4 pairs of double threads on canvas. The fill in stitches are one-half the length of regular stitches.

The heavy black lines on chart are one-fourth of pillow. To work from chart, begin in lower left corner as indicated, work across to CENTER ROW, indicated by arrow at right. Count from CENTER ROW back to beginning to guide you for second half of width of

pillow. Refer to chart as you work to vertical CENTER LINE; then work from CENTER LINE back to beginning for vertical pattern.

Helpful Hints: Fold masking tape around edges of canvas to prevent raveling. Before removing tape, block all worked parts. Never press, it will make stitches very flat looking and will not get canvas back to shape. Remove tape and trim excess canvas, leaving ½ inch all around.







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
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


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
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
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


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
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
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

Crochet Hat/Scarf Set



Materials needed to make this attractive set are about 2 ounces each of three shades of same color, shade A (dark), shade B (light), shade C (medium) 4-ply knitting worsted weight yarn; about 4 ounces Mohair (to match shade B of knitting worsted); size G metal crochet hook.

Abbreviations:

ch (chain) rnd (round)
sc (single crochet) dc (double crochet)
sp (space) sk (skip)
dec (decrease) st (stitch)

Gauge: Each motif measures about 4 inches.

SCARF—Motif: (Make 4) Beginning with color A, ch 4, join to form ring.

Rnd 1: Ch 3, 2 dc in ring, * ch 3, 3 dc in ring, repeat from * twice more, ch 3, join. Join color B between units of dc in ch 3 sps.

Rnd 2: Ch 3, 2 dc in same sp, ch 3, 3 dc in same sp, * ch 1, 3 dc in next ch 3 sp, ch 3, 3 dc in same sp, repeat from * twice more, ch 1, join. Join color C in corner of square in ch 3 sp.

Rnd 3: Ch 3, 2 dc in same sp, ch 3, 3 dc in same sp, * ch 1, 3 dc in next ch 1 sp, ch 1, 3 dc in next corner, ch 3, 3 dc in same corner, repeat from * twice more, ch 1, 3 dc in next ch 1 sp, ch 1, join.

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Join Mohair and work 1 rnd of sc, working 1 sc in each dc and each ch 1, 3 sc in each corner, join.

Sew 2 motifs together.

Join Mohair to corner of right hand motif, ch 3, dc in next sc, * ch 2, sk 2 sc, dc in each of next 2 sc, repeat from * to corner (6 times more), ending with dc in corner of first motif on left side, turn.

Next Row: Ch 5, * 2 dc in ch 2 sp, ch 2. Repeat from * 6 times more, ch 2, dc in last dc of previous row.

Next Row: Ch 3, dc in first ch 2 sp, * ch 2, 2 dc in next ch 2 sp, repeat from * across, end 1 dc in last sp, 1 dc in third ch of last sp.

Repeat last 2 rows for desired length of scarf, fasten off.

Sew 2 more motifs together, sew to opposite end of scarf. Trim with fringe at both ends.

Fringe: Wind yarn around 4-inch cardboard. Cut one end and knot in every other sc on ends, trim evenly.

HAT: Make 5 motifs as for scarf, sew together. Remainder is worked in Mohair.

Face Edge: Work 1 sc in each dc and sp of lower edge, join.

Work 4 more rnds of sc, dec'ing 5 sts each rnd. (To decrease, sk 1 sc of previous rnd.)

Top of Hat: Join Mohair at opposite side of hat, ch 3, dc in next dc, * sk 1 dc, dc in each of next 2 dc, repeat from * around, join.

Next Row: Ch 3, dc in next dc, * dc in next dc, sk 1 dc, dc in each of next 2 dc, repeat from * around, join.

Repeat last row 3 times more.

Last Row: Ch 3, * sk 1 dc, dc in next dc, repeat from * around. Leave 6-inch end of yarn. Pull work together at top with this end. Fasten off.

Attach pompon.

To Make Pompon: Wind 20 strands of yarn over a 3-inch (or whatever size desired) cardboard, tie around center. Cut ends. Trim into a ball.

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Man's Scarf

Abbreviations:

p (purl) MC (main color)

Gauge: 5 sts equal 1 inch 6 rows equal 1 inch With MC, cast on 43 sts.

Pattern St—Row 1: K 3, * p 1, k 3, repeat from * across.

Row 2: K 1, * p 1, k 3, repeat from *, end p 1, k 1.

Repeat these 2 rows for pattern, working 10 more rows with MC. * Work 2 rows color A, 2 rows MC, 2 rows color B, 2 rows MC, 2 rows color C, 2 rows MC, repeat from * to 47 inches from beginning or desired length. End with 12 rows MC. Bind off in pattern.

Fringe: Cut 8-inch strands of each of the 4 colors. Hold the 4 color strands together, fold in half, draw through k rib at one end, draw ends through loop and tighten. Repeat in every k rib on both ends.


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Finished size of this scarf is approximately 8 x 48 inches without fringe. Materials required are about 4 ounces main color (MC), 2 ounces each of contrasting colors A, B and C, 2-ply Bear Brand Winsom yarn. Use one pair number 9 Susan Bates standard knitting needles and a large crochet hook for fringe.


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Bargello Pillow

Completed pillow measures approximately 14 inches square. You need a 15-inch square of No. 10 Penelope needlepoint canvas, tapestry needle and five colors of yarn suggested or your own choice of colors. Yarn colors used in this pillow are dark purple, about 8 yards; wine, about 10 yards; dark rose, about 10 yards; light rose, about 7

yards; lavender, about 8 yards. Also needed will be a 15-inch square of material for backing and a 14-inch pillow.

This Bargello stitch, used throughout the pillow (except where necessary to fill in along top and lower edges) is worked by inserting needle from back to front, counting 3 spaces or
