





EAGLE SQUARE FOR A BEDSPREAD.

THIS bedspread has a centre of these crochet squares, and squares of linen in Broderie Anglais used alternately. It requires about four squares across and five in length. This is surrounded by a deep band of linen, mitred at the corners, which may be edged with a crochet lace, or simply with a hem.

Or, again, the bedspread might have an Old Bleach linen centre with a monogram or initials embroidered on it. This would be surrounded by one or two rows of squares, either all crochet, or alternate with embroidered ones, which would be edged with a band of linen to make it the required size.

These are only suggestions, the clever worker will easily find better ones to suit herself.



Make a foundation chain of 230.



For the Stripes.—Make a foundation of 42 chain.

ist row.—Miss 7 ch., I tr., then 2 ch., miss 2, I tr. eleven times, making twelve spaces in the row, 3 ch., turn.



2nd row.—9 tr. over 3 spaces, 10 ch., turn.

3rd row.—Miss 7 ch., I tr., 5 more

spaces, 2 ch. 4 sl. sts from the third horizontal tr., turn.

4th row.—21 tr. over 7 spaces, 10 ch., turn.

5th row.—Miss 7 ch., I tr., 9 more spaces, 2 ch., 4 sl. sts. from third horizontal tr., turn.

6th row.—33 tr., over 11 spaces, 5 ch., turn. Repeat from the first row of instructions for the lace.

For the Stars.—Make 9 ch. and join in a circle.

1st row.—3 ch. (for a tr.), 29 tr. in the circle, join to the 3 ch.

2nd row.—3 d.c. over 3 tr., then 8 ch., miss 4, I d.c. in next to form a picot, 4 ch. I d.c. on last d.c. for another picot, make three more picots the same as last one, I d.c. in the ch. before the first picot, to bring the picots into a circle; 3 ch. and repeat from the beginning of the row nine times more. Join four of these circles of picots to the points of the stripes, two on each side of the narrowest part. For the corner, join each star by two circles

and join the next two circles of each star to each other.

For the Edging.—Ist row.—I d.c. in the 5 ch. to the left of the point of the stripes, * then 7 ch. I d.c. in the middle picot of each of the following six little circles, 7 ch. I d.c. in the loop to the right of the point of the stripes, 3 ch. I d.c. in the loop to the left; repeat from *. At the corner, work right round both stars.

2nd row.—Under each loop of 7 ch. work 3 d.c., 4 ch., 3 d.c., 4 ch., 3 d.c. On the first and last loop of the scallop, omit the picots and make 6 d.c. in each loop, with 3 d.c. in the 3 ch. that crosses to the following scallop.

For the Heading.—Ist row.—3 tr. under each row along the top. At the corner, omit one row on the first side and one row on the next.

2nd row.—2 ch. miss 2, I tr. At the corner, omit the chain and miss 3 tr. on the one side and 3 on the other.

3rd row.—2 ch. and I tr. in each space of last row, omitting the chain at the corner.

DINMONT LACE.

Perlé, No. 8, which may be had in several shades, and is useful for trimming canvas table covers, or piano tops of the same colour. It may also be used for window blinds or curtains. The diamond shaped patterns are worked separately and joined to each other in working the last row of each.

For the Diamond.—Make 10 chain and join in a circle.

1st row.—3 ch. (for a tr.), 31 tr. in the circle and join to the 3 ch.

2nd row.—* 5 ch. miss I tr., 7 d.c. on next 7 tr. Repeat from * three times more, I sl. st. under 5 ch.

3rd row.—4 ch. (for a l. tr.), I l. tr. (cotton over the needle twice) under 5 ch., * 3 ch., 2 l. tr., retaining the last two stitches of the first l. tr. on the needle, and working them off with the last two stitches of the second l. tr. Repeat from * four times more, thus having six groups of l. tr. in the 5 ch. then 3 ch. miss 2 d.c., 2 l. tr.

worked in the same way, in the next d.c. Repeat right round the diamond and finish with 3 ch. I sl. st. under the 4 ch.

This completes the first pattern. In working next and subsequent pattern join the one to the other thus:—after making two groups of l. tr. under the 5 ch., make 3 ch. join to the second space of the opposite group, then 2 ch., miss 2 of the 3 ch. I d.c. in next, I ch., make two more groups of l. tr. under the 5 ch. then 5 ch. and join the next to the corresponding space opposite, then finish in the usual way. At the corner, join by two nearest corners, leaving two unattached corners to the outside or edge of the lace.

For the Heading.—Ist row.—I tr. in the first space between the l. tr., 5 ch., I d.c. in each of the three following spaces, 5 ch. I tr. in the next space, then 7 ch. and work between the corners thus:—Miss I space, I l. tr. (cetton over the needle three times)

in each of the three following spaces of the one pattern and on the first three spaces of the next pattern, retaining the last two stitches of each l. tr. on the needle and then working all off at once, 7 ch. and repeat from the beginning of the row. At the corner, make 3 ch. between the two groups of 6 l. tr.

2nd row.—I tr. in the first space of 5 ch., 3 ch. I tr. in each of the three following spaces, 3 ch. I tr. in the fourth of 7 ch., 3 ch. I tr. again in same stitch, 3 ch. I tr. in fourth of next 7 ch., 3 ch. I tr. again in same stitch, 3 ch. and repeat from the beginning of the row. At the corner, after working the 2 tr. separated by 3 ch. in the middle of 7 ch., make I tr. in the second of 3 ch.



BABY'S KNITTED BIB.

Our pattern is knitted with strong knitting cotton and rather thick steel needles.

For the bib a foundation of 60 stitches is required.

The first stitch of each row is always slipped and is not included in the number of stitches.

decrease, 16 plain, decrease, 18 plain, increase, 2 plain.

3rd row.—All plain.

4 plain stitches in the middle, and here the openwork pattern ends.

(In the following 31 rows, decrease to the right and left of the 2 middle stitches, and increase at the beginning and end of each row as before.)

The next 7 rows are worked quite plain.

26th row.—After increasing, work 3 plain, 9 purl, 9 plain, 4 purl, decrease, 2 plain, decrease, 4 plain, 9 purl, 9 plain, 3 purl, and the edge.

27th row.—Like the twenty-sixth

row, only at the beginning and end, 4 instead of 3 plain, and purl. The twenty-sixth and twenty-seventh rows are repeated nine times, always decreasing in the middle and increasing at the edge.

Finish with 4 rows of plain knitting and fasten off the stitches.

For the Edging.—I d.c., then 5 ch. miss 2 rows, I d.c. in the next. At the corners omit I row only between the d.c. In the following 3 rows, the d.c. is worked in the middle of the loops of chain.



LONG CROCHET COAT.



THIS new design of a crochet coat in Faudel's Peacock double knitting wool, which can be had in white and in all colours and mixtures —or if a softer make is required, 6 or 8-ply Peacock Fingering is very niceis worked with a thick 18-inch long bone hook, No. 7. The coat is semitight fitting, and it is necessary to get a good fitting pattern for which we give in our illustrations the outlines. Although we give the detailed description, it is always necessary to compare the work with the pattern and to correct it accordingly. No description can be exact for every worker. The size of the needles, the sort of wool, and especially the looser or tighter working make such a difference to the size of the work that often a hand worked garment looks clumsy and fits badly if it is worked after a description

only and not frequently compared and corrected according to the pattern. But if our readers are once used to work according to pattern a description will not be necessary for them if they only have an explanation of the used stitches. The coat is worked in two fronts, two backs, two sleeves in tricot stitches with crescents. The collar, cuffs and bands are worked in ribbed double crochet stitches, but they can just as well be worked in knitting I row plain and I row purl.


For each front part make a foundation of 80 ch., and work I row of tricot or 2 rows tunese. The tunese stitches are worked as follows: After a chain of the required length for the next row, turn, I ch., pass the hook through the first loop, draw the wool through and keep the loop on the hook, put the hook through the next chain of the foundation, draw the wool through and keep the loop also on the hook and repeat this to the end of the row. Second row going backward, lay the wool over the hook and draw it through the first loop to make the edge, then lay the wool again over the hook and draw it through two loops on the hook, lay the wool again over the hook and draw it through two loops and repeat this until the end of the row. These 2 rows tunese are counted as I tricot row.

Then follows the pattern. Work 10 rows tunese or 5 rows tricot, and after 3 stitches in the eleventh row tunese, pick up the third vertical stitch in the fifth tricot row, wool over hook, make a loop by drawing it through and leave it on the hook; then pick up the fourth vertical stitch in the fourth tricot row, wool over hook,




Detail for Collar, Front, and Cuffs.

make a loop and leave it on the hook; then pick up fifth vertical stitch in the third tricot row, put the wool over the hook, make a loop and leave it on the hook; pick up the sixth vertical stitch in the second tricot row, wool over the hook, make a loop and leave it on the hook; at last pick up the seventh vertical stitch in the second tricot row, wool over the hook, draw it through and leave the loop on the hook. Then wool over needle, draw through the first stitch on the hook, wool over hook and draw through two loops, wool over hook and draw through two loops, wool over the hook and draw through two loops, wool over the hook and draw through the last two loops of the crescent, then make 6 stitches of the eleventh row tunese (in the sixth tricot row) and repeat after the ninth stitch of this row to work the crescent pattern. Repeat this pattern to the end of the row at every sixth stitch of the tunese row, then work 5 rows tricot and in the twenty-first row tunese, to make the crescents alternately; start the crescent with the sixth vertical stitch, and

repeat after each sixth vertical stitch to the end of the row, and so on.

The following twentieth tricot row, decrease I stitch by working 2 stitches at the side together, but do not alter the pattern which is to be counted from the centre front. The next 220 tunese rows decrease every tenth row I stitch, the next 80 rows increase every twentieth row I stitch. For the armhole, miss 8 stitches, the next 10 tricot rows decrease I stitch each row. Work then 17 rows tricot without alteration. In the next row decrease 15 stitches for the neck, the next 32 tricot rows decrease each row by I stitch for the neck and increase for the shoulder I stitch every tenth row.

The back is worked in two parts. Start at the bottom and make a foundation of 80 ch., on which work I tricot row, then start the pattern. After 80 rows tricot decrease up to the 192nd row I stitch in every fifth row at this side of the armhole; centre back leave straight. Then decrease in the next

48 rows every twentieth row I stitch, decrease the next 16 rows tricot each row for the armhole I stitch till only 31 stitches are left on the hook. Work on these 36 rows and decrease the next 16 rows alternately by I and by 2 stitches for the shoulder, in the seventeenth row, miss 12 stitches for the neck, then work 2 rows and finish off.

When these parts are done, join the backs on the inside and the fronts to the back, leaving the sides 10 inches from the bottom open.

For each sleeve make a foundation of 40 ch. and work 80 rows tricot,

increasing each fourth row I stitch in the centre. In the next 8 rows tricot increase I stitch in each second row. From 89th to II2th rows increase the upper sleeve 2 stitches each second row. The II3th to I44th rows increase




Diagram showing Pattern of Coat.

each third row I stitch on the same side. The next 40 rows decrease for the upper sleeve each sixth row I stitch and increase for the under sleeve each twentieth row I stitch. In the 185th row decrease for the under sleeve 14 stitches. In the 186th to 202nd rows decrease the upper sleeve I stitch in each second row, and the undersleeve in each row by I stitch. The next 8 rows decrease on each side 2 stitches in each row. Then join the sleeve from the inside. When the sleeve is finished make 6 pleats in the upper sleeves, and finish with 2 rows double crochet, whereby with the first row the pleats are caught and the second joins the coat from the inside.

For the cuffs, work on the end of the sleeves 10 rows knitting or in ribbed double crochet stitches and turn over.

To work this stitch put the wool around the hook, put the hook through

the back loop of the foundation chain, put the wool around the hook and draw it through the loops on the hook, continue to the end of the row, turn the work and repeat, always taking up the back loops.

The turned over collar is worked on a foundation of 24 ch. in ribbed double crochet stitches or in knitting, and then sewn round neck.

The band in front is worked in knitting or on a foundation of 10 stitches in ribbed double crochets, and then sewn on. For each buttonhole make 3 stitches, miss 4, make 3, turn and make 3 stitches, 4 chains, 4 stitches. Sew on buttons to fit the buttonholes. On sides sew three buttons on each side and connect them with cord made in chain of the same wool.

The band around the bottom can be worked on the foundation of the coat in knitting or in ribbed double crochet stitches.

BOLERO BODICE.

THIS is knitted from a French shape; it is open in the front and short under the arms as worn in Paris, for, being short the waist is not enlarged. The original was knitted for a 36-inch bust and 8 stitches to the inch in knitting. Those requiring a smaller size should gauge their knitting to 10 stitches to the inch. Four oz. of Paton's 3-ply fingering are required for the large size, if finer wool is used the size will be rather smaller.

Abbreviations.—K., knit plain; p., purl; inst., increase by knitting 2 on

the next stitch; p.t., purl 2 together; t., knit 2 together; m., make a stitch by bringing the wool forward; s., slip the stitch; o., wool round needle to make a stitch.

Cast on 169 stitches.

Ist row.—Knit plain.

2nd row.—K. 64. inst. on next, k. 36, inst. on next, k. 38. Turn, you leave 29. 3rd row.—S. 1, k. 112. Turn.

4th row.—S. I, then m.t. fifty-six times, k. 3. Turn.

5th row.—S. I, k. 42, inst. in next,

k. 35, inst. in next, k. 39. Turn. 6th row.—S. I, then m.t. sixty time

6th row.—S. 1, then m.t. sixty times, k. 3. Turn.

7th row.—S. I, k. 42, inst. on next, k. 41, inst. on next, k. 43. Turn.

8th row.—S. I, then m.t. sixty-four times, k. 3. Turn.

9th row.—S. 1, k. 44, inst. on next, k. 41, inst. on next, k. 48. Turn.

10th row.—S. 1, then m.t. sixty-eight times, k. 6. Turn.

11th row.—S. 1, k. 51, inst, on next, k. 43, inst., k. 52. Turn.

12th row.—S. 1, then m.t. eight times, k. 37 inst., k. 42, inst., k. 37, then m.t. eight times, k. 2. Turn

13th row.—S. 1, k. 54, inst. on next, k. 45, inst. on next, k. 59. Turn.

14th row.—S. I, then m.t. ten times, k. 128, then m.t. ten times, k. rest.

15th row.—S. 1, k. 64, inst. on next, k. 48, inst. on next, k. 68.

16th row.—S. I, k. 2, then m.t. eleven times, k. 5, then p. 3 and k. 3, twenty-one times, k. 3, then m.t. eleven times, k. 2, t.

17th row.—S. 1, k. 27, then p. 3, k. 3, six times, o., then p. 3, k. 3 nine times, o., then p. 3, k. 3 seven times, k. 24.

18th row.—S. 1, k. 2, then m.t. ten times, k. 10, then p. 3, k. 3 five times,

p. 3, k. I, then k. 3, p. 3 nine times, k. I, then k. 3, p. 3 six times, k. 5, then m.t. ten times, k. 3.



K. 2, then p. 3, k. 3 eight times, p. 6, then k. 3, p. 3 nine times, k. 6, then p. 3, k. 3 seven times, p. 3, k. 2, p. 2; these stitches are purled alternate rows, m.t. four times, k. 3.

23rd row.—S. I, k. 17, then p. 3, k. 3 seven times, p. 3, o., then p. 3, k. 3 ten times, m., k. 3, p. 3 eight times, k. 18.

24th row.—S. 1, k. 2, m.t. four times, p. 2, k. 5, then p. 3, k. 3 eight times, p. 1, then k. 3, p. 3 ten times, k. 1, then p. 3, k. 3 eight times, p. 4, m.t. four times, k. 3.

25th row.—S. I, k. 14, then p. 3, k. 3 eight times, o., p. I, then k. 3, p. 3 ten times, k. I, o., then p. 3, k. 3 nine times, k. 12.

26th row.—S. 1, k. 2, m.t. four times, p. 2, k. 2, then p. 3, k. 3 eight times, p. 3, k. 2, then p. 3, k. 3 ten times, p. 2, then k. 3, p. 3 eight times, p. 4, m.t. four times, k. 3.

27th row.—S. I, k. 12, t., k. 3, then knit the checks to the next open stitch, m., k. 2, knit the next 20 little checks, p. 2, m., then the checks again, as far as the last 15 stitches where p. I, t., k. 12.

28th row.—S. I, k. 2, m.t. four times, p. 2, then keep the pattern of checks to the last border or last 13 stitches, p. 2, m.t. four times, k. 3.

29th row.—S. 1, k. 12, then in checks increasing before and after the centre, which is for the back. Knit the last 13 plain.

30th row.—Repeat the twenty-eighth row.

31st row.—S. I, k. II, k. 2, t., knit in checks, keeping the pattern carefully to the last 14 stitches, on those t., k. 12.

The pattern can now be readily followed.

*Repeat the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth rows, the twenty-eighth row again. Repeat the thirty-first row, then repeat from * three more times.

Then repeat the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth rows only until the end of the seventy-fifth row. This brings the work to the division for the armholes.

76th row.—Knit the first 45 stitches according to the pattern, cast off 13. Knit in checks to the last 58 stitches, east off 13. Knit the remaining stitches in the pattern. Turn.

FIRST FRONT.

This is knitted on the first 45 stitches. If the needles are long leave the other stitches on the needle, if not, take them off on a third needle. The border is kept entirely as before, also the checks; knit 8 rows, decreasing by knitting 2 together on the armhole side each row.

85th row.—The border—no decrease at the end of the row.

86th row.—T., finish the row according to the pattern.

Repeat these 2 rows four times.

93rd row.—S. 1, k. 10, p. 2. Purl 1 on the base of next loop, then knit the loop and finish the row to pattern.

94th row.—Like the eighty-sixth row. Repeat the eighty-fifth and eighty-sixth rows three times.

101st row and 3 following rows like the eighty-fifth row.

105th row.—Knit in the pattern to the 3 last stitches. Increase in the first, k. 2. Knit 31 more rows following the pattern and increase on the arm-hole side as before in the fifth, fifteenth, and twenty-fifth of the 31 rows.

137th row.—Leave the last 3 stitches. Turn. Work back as before.

139th row.—Leave 6. Knit back as before.

Repeat this row four more times, leaving 3 more stitches each time.

144th row.—Knit plain all the stitches.

145th row.—Knit border, rest plain. Repeat these 2 rows twice and cast off.
THE SECOND FRONT.

Commence on the first of the 45 stitches just before the cast off ones on the other side the work. Work the first front over again, but reverse the decreasings in the eighty-sixth row; it will end with t. In the 105th and following rows, the stitches left are also reversed.

THE BACK.

There are 104 stitches left on the seventy-sixth row. The pattern is to be kept carefully throughout, it will not be given again, only the decreasings.

stitches, t.t. Pattern to last 4

2nd row.—No decreasings.

3rd row.—T. at each end of row. Repeat the second and third rows eight times.

20th and 21st rows.—No decreasings.

Repeat the third, twentieth, and twenty first rows four times, then 22 rows with no decreasings. This brings the work to the shoulders.

THE SHOULDERS AND NECK. 56th row.—Cast of 3. Knit as before to the end.

57th row.—Like fifty-sixth row. Repeat these 2 rows until there are 19 ribs or checks left, then commence the curve for the neck.

ist row of neck.—Cast off 3. Knit in pattern 17 stitches. Turn, S. 1. Knit in pattern to the end.

3rd row.—Cast off 3. K. II in pattern. Turn, S. I. Pattern on rest. 5th row.—Cast off 3. K. I2 in

pattern Turn, S 1. Pattern on rest. 7th row.—Cast off 2. Knit plain to last 20 stitches, on those keep the pattern.

8th row.—Like first row.

10th row.—Like third row.

12th row.—Like fifth row.

14th row.—Cast off 2. Knit plain to end.

15th row.—Cast off 2. M.t. to end of row.

16th row.—Plain. Repeat the 2 last rows twice, then 3 plain rows, and cast off.

Sew the shoulders together, joining the borders neatly. The shoulders on the back part must be held in a little if necessary.

THE BORDER.

Round the outside edge of the bolero, crochet (holding the right side of the work next you). I d.c. on first stitch, * 3 ch., miss a stitch, I d.c. on next. Repeat from *. At the corners, work 4 ch.

Round the arm-holes, work a row of d.c.

2nd row.—I d.c. on first d.c., * 4 ch., pass a d.c., I d.c. on the next. Repeat from *.

3rd row.—* I d.c. over next 4 ch., 3 ch. Repeat from * and fasten off.

A button-hole is made quite at the bottom of the right-hand front, by working round with a needle full of wool, the first opening of the first row of the border. A button must be placed on the plain edge on the opposite side.

KNITTED GLOVES.

Soft Knitting wool with six thin steel needles. Cast on 64 stitches on four needles (16 stitches on each), and knit in a round 28 rows, alternately, I row purl and I row plain. In the twenty-ninth row knit together every stitch with a foundation chain to form the doubled border. Then follow 10 rows alternately I row purl, I row plain. The fortieth row for the pattern alternately knit 4 purl 4.

41st row.—Knit.

42nd row.—Alternately purl 4, knit 4. 43rd row.—Knit.

The fortieth to forty-third row repeat five times. In the third row of the sixth repetition decrease four times by knitting together the sixth and seventh stitch, the twenty second and twenty-

third stitch, the thirty-eighth and thirty-ninth stitch, and the fifty-fourth and fifty-fifth stitch. Then repeat the pattern six times more up to the beginning of the thumb. For the thumb make a gusset in the third row of the twelfth repetition of the pattern by increasing 2 stitches in making, knit 2 out of the first and last stitch of the row. The fourth row of the twelfth repetition, increase 4 stitches over the decreasings of the sixth repetition. Continue the pattern for the hand up to the fingers. The thumb and all fingers knit plain.

The increase for the gusset of the thumb, repeat at the right-hand left from the first increase. The first time after 5 rows, then eight times after every 4 rows, so as to have 20 stitches for the thumb. Cast on now 5 stitches, bring these 25 stitches on three needles in a round. The newly cast on 5 stitches knit plain and decrease them in the next 3 rows. Knit the thumb 36 rows high; on the thirty-seventh row decrease every needle I stitch by knitting 2 stitches together and continue decreasing every second row until only 5 stitches are left which are drawn together and secured on the inside, then break wool.

On the other stitches of the hand, work the pattern eight times.

Then knit for the forefinger the first 5 stitches of the row next the thumb, cast on 8 new stitches and take the last 10 stitches of row, bring these 23 stitches on three needles, knit 48 rows plain in a round and finish this finger as the thumb.

For the middle finger knit on the 8 new stitches for the fore-finger, take up 8 stitches of the inner hand, 6

newly cast on stitches, and 8-stitches of the upper hand, and knit in the first row together the third and fourth, the fifth and sixth stitch of the new stitches. In the next 4 rows knit together the 2 first 2 stitches, the remaining 25 stitches knit for 54 rows and close up as before.

The fourth finger work on the 6 new stitches of the middle finger, 8 stitches of the under-hand, 4 newly cast on stitches, and 9 stitches of the upper hand. In the first row, knit together of these 27 stitches the first

and second, the third and fourth, the fifth and sixth, newly cast on stitches of the middle finger. In the second row, knit together the first and second, the third and fourth stitches. On these 22 stitches knit 46 rows and close up as before.

The little finger is worked on the 4 new stitches of the fourth finger, and the remaining 16 stitches of the hand. In the first row knit of the 4 stitches 2 together, then follow 35 rows and close up as before.



gift to an old lady, useful and beautiful, and never out of fashion. When worn over a black silk dress of an evening it is a most becoming article of dress, and there are few elderly ladies but like to possess one, as they know quite well it adds a charm to old age—for age has its charms in spite of all that is said about youth's brightness, etc. Many an elderly lady also would find this a most enticing piece of work, if only

they would make up their mind to begin. I have sometimes induced an old lady who thought herself only fit to knit garters to try something else, and she actually found she could knit a shawl and get much interested therein.

The great drawback to many who have tried to knit these shawls is that when the shawl was finished there seemed always something wrong—the plain piece in the centre was always puckered, and the border seemed too

tight for the centre. I experienced the same myself with the first ones I knitted, and set myself to discover wherein was the fault. I did so, and found that there were not enough stitches on the border to make it full, so at once began to remedy my mistake. I now give the result of my experience in the following correct pattern.

Use Faudel's Gossamer or Shetland Wool and cast on 120 stitches in 2-ply white fingering wool. Knit plain knitting till there are 120 rows—that means really 240 rows, because it takes 2 rows to make 120 in the counting. Having done that, proceed with the border, but first increase the number of stitches by lifting the thread every 2 stitches, which means an increase of I stitch after every 2. When that row is finished, knit I plain row before beginning the pattern. I will give first the pattern for the corner, which, if done correctly, will meet the next corner so exactly that when joined no join will be observed. To those not accustomed to knitting I will explain that p. means plain, t. means take 2 together, o. means put over the thread.

Now see that this first row is absolutely correct, and finish exactly. If you find there is not enough stitches to complete the pattern, just make I or 2 by lifting them.

Now follows 3 plain rows, which is easy enough. When these are finished, do the second row of the corner pattern, and then proceed with the rest as before. T. three times, then o., p. I six times, t. six times, repeating that alternately till you come to t. 3 together near the end; and then the second row of corner, beginning at the end as before. Then 3 plain rows as before. Then third row of corner, and the rest of the row as before. Then 3 plain rows, which are done between each open row. When the 14 rows of corner are done the border is complete.

Should the corner prove too intricate to follow or remember, you can leave it out, and do the border in this way instead. The corner will not be quite so full, but will not look amiss. Take 2 together three times, then o. p. I six times, then take 2 together six times, then o. p. I six times, and do this alternately till near the end, when take 2 together three times. Just observe, take 2 together three times at beginning and end—the rest of the row is T. six times alternately, with the o. p. I six times. This will look slightly different from the corner pattern, being close work instead of open, but I observe many Shetland shawls are done this way. Cast off very loosely, and sew the corners neatly together. When the one side of the border is finished, take up the stitches along the side (there should be 120), and proceed as with the first side.

The knitting of the shawl being finished, to make it really beautiful, proceed in the following fashion. Put it in plenty of cold water to steep for a whole night. Next morning take a

packet of Lux, dissolve it in boiling water, then add a large quantity of lukewarm water. Put the shawl into this, and wash it out quickly, then put it into a large quantity of lukewarm water and squeeze out all the Lux.

Put the shawl into a large towel, drying it as far as possible, then place a sheet on the drawing-room floor, place the shawl on this, pulling it out till perfectly square, then leave it there till perfectly dry.

CROCHET JACKET AND CAP FOR GIRLS OF EIGHT TO TEN YEARS.

POR the jacket use 18 ounces Baldwin & Walker "Ladyship" 4-ply fingering wool and one dozen mother-ofpearl buttons; for the cap, $3\frac{1}{2}$ ounces wool, $1\frac{1}{2}$ yards white $1\frac{1}{2}$ -inch silk ribbon.

The jacket is worked to pattern, but it is not necessary to work exactly to the outlines of the pattern, as the work stretches. It is sufficient to

decrease twice at the front and the back. The jacket consists of the two front parts, the back, the upper and under All parts sleeves. are executed in shell pattern we have used before (see No. 10, p. 31, No. 7, p. 22), only the turnover collar and the cuffs are worked in Tunese or German crochet stitches. All parts are started at the bottom.

For the front, work on a foundation of 73 ch.

1st row.—Miss 3 ch., 2 tr. in the next ch., * miss 2 ch., 1 tr. in the next ch., miss 2 ch., 5 tr. in the next ch. Repeat

from *. This row, closing with a chain, contains II ½ shells. Then turn.

2nd row.—3 ch., 2 tr. in the backward stitch of the ch., * I ch. in the middle of the 5 tr., 5 tr. in the backward stitch of the next ch. Repeat from *. The ch. are always worked in the two stitches of the tr. Finish the row with a ch. worked in the first

of the 3 missed ch. In this way work 24 rows. Then decrease by leaving out the 2 tr. at the beginning of the row, and commence with the ch. in the middle tr. of the first shell. After 3 or 4 inches decrease a second time for the armhole. Cut the wool and commence 3 shells further. Work some rows without decreasing, and

continue according to the pattern. The second front part is worked opposite to the first. For the back make again a foundation of 73 ch., and decrease twice as by the front. The finished parts join from the back with d.c.


For the upper sleeves make a foundation of 24 ch., for the under sleeves a foundation of 21 ch., and work according to the pattern. The finished parts join from the back by d.c., which must be worked very tight. Then join the sleeves to the jacket by d.c.

The cuffs are

worked in Tunese or German crochet in 27 rows on a foundation of 15 ch.

1st row.—Put the hook through the foundation ch., make a stitch and leave it on the needle, pick up the next ch., make a stitch, leave it on the needle, and so on.





Take a strip of stiff linen, 1¼ inch wide, 24 inches long, double it, lay it under the long tr., cover it with the short tr. as lining, and sew the edge of the lining to the edge of the cap. Draw a silk ribbon through the long tr., whereby always 2 tr. come over and 4 under the ribbon, and tie the ends of the ribbon in a bow as in our illustration.


POINTED TRIMMING FOR THE CENTRE OF AN EVENING DRESS IN GOLD BEADS AND BUGLES.

Materials.—Gold beads, No. 9, cut garnet thread, Apache needles, No. 14, gold bugles, piece of wax. Black, opal, silver, and also almost any colour may be obtained.

Wind round an Apache bead frame 4 strands of thread, miss 5 notches in the frame, and put on 4 more threads, miss 5 more notches and put on 4 more threads, miss 5 more notches and put on 4 more threads. Fasten the end of the thread to the frame.

Thread a No. 14 needle with a thread

I bugle, I gold. In going back, omit to thread the first gold, and thread through the other 2 gold and 2 bugles. Draw up the thread to where you commenced to weave, thread the 3 gold and 3 bugles and 3 gold, and weave back again to the fringe. Make the fringe again of 3 golds and 2 bugles. Repeat the weaving again at the top. When coming to the fringe, make it longer by I gold, I bugle, doing this alternately with the weaving, three times. Weave backwards and for-


In making the new tiny daisy necklet:—

Materials.—Apache needles, cut garnet thread and loom beads. For exquisite necklet use the cut garnet beads.

In making these necklets it is better to wax the thread well.

*First.—Take 5 coloured and 1 yellow bead (for centre). Leave a piece of thread hanging. Hold that in your left hand, take up first bead, pushing needle from right to left; take 3 more

coloured beads, push needle through fifth bead. (This finishes the first row), then take 2 more coloured beads, and go through the last 2 of the 3 beads from right to left, and come back through the 2 beads just added. Take 3 coloured beads and 1 yellow, go through first of the 2 beads just mentioned from left to right. Take 3 coloured beads, and go through the third of the 3 beads from right to left. This finishes second daisy and repeat from *.



The New Daisy Necklet.



SMALL GOLD CHAIN WITH OVAL PEARL BEADS.

Materials.—Cut garnet thread, gold rope beads, No. 3, oval pearl beads, piece of wax, a bolt ring. Other beads can be used instead of oval pearls, also instead of gold rope beads. Coloured rope beads to match colour of dress look very effective.

Thread to be cut 4 yards long and well waxed. Fasten the thread at the half on the ring, thread I pearl bead and 27 small rope gold beads. Repeat I pearl and 27 gold as long as it is needful. When finished, thread the other piece of cotton with a 14 Apache



needle, thread through the pearl bead, then thread through I gold bead, on the same string as the pearl. Now put I gold bead on to the needle, miss I bead on the other string and draw through the second of the 27 gold beads already threaded. Draw up to form the chain, thread another gold bead on the needle, miss a bead at the twenty-seventh, and insert in the next bead, drawing them up one at a time to make an even chain. When the whole of the 27 are threaded, put through the second pearl bead, and do the same again with the gold beads, threading I and missing I until finished. Fasten the thread into the other end of the ring.

EIGHT-INCH D'OYLEY.

Materials required.—I yard of 27-inch Brussels net which will make half




Fig. 2. Loop Bead D'Oyley.

a dozen 8-inch d'oyleys, 1 ball of Ardern's crochet cotton, No. 20, Wynberg cut beads.

an inch larger than required to allow for hem. Thread beads on to crochet cotton. Commence by I d.c. into net, 14 ch. to make a loop and I d.c. into net. Continue this for first row, about 35 loops in all.

2nd row.—15 ch. and I d.c. into middle of first row of loops.

3rd row.—7 ch., I bead, 7 ch. and I d.c. into middle of previous row.

General size used for the d'oyleys: 6 inches, 8 inches, 10 inches, round; oval, 18 inches by 12 inches, 22 inches by 16 inches, 26 inches by 18 inches.

LOOP BEAD D'OYLEYS.

Square.—6 inches by 6 inches, 8 inches by 8 inches, 10 inches by 10 inches.

Beads to be used, "Tosca,"
"Venetian Spun," "Lustre
Perlés."

As the beads are rather large, double thread should be used to give greater strength. These d'oyleys are intended for covering milk, fruit, jam, puddings, or anything which is set aside for future use. They prove an effectual screen from the blue-bottle and other insects, at the same time cannot be blown off by a current of air, and give a dainty appearance to the dish.

KNITTED UNDERSLEEVES.

WE give in the above illustration one of a pair of knitted undersleeves worked in Beehive Eider wool as protection for lace sleeves or bare arms. If worked in darker and thicker wool, this sleeve protector will be useful for workers.

Cast on 100 stitches, work loosely, 40 rows knit I, purl I, then decrease five times by I, after every 7 rows as Fig. 2 shows.

The cuffs are worked with finer needles. If required, the sleeve can be prolonged


on top.

Ist row.—Plain.

2nd row. — Knit 3, 1 over, knit 3 together, 1 over, and repeat from the beginning.

3rd row.—Plain. Then cast off and draw a ribbon or elastic through the holes.

AN EMBROIDERED CUSHION.

MBROIDERIES are, I think, a great adornment to a room, but however beautiful everything in a room may be, there must be comfort as well, and there is no article in which comfort and beauty can be combined so well as in a sofa cushion. The design here given, when worked for a cushion, will make an extremely pretty addition to any room. The design is composed of nasturtiums flowers which suggest such lovely colouring, and look lovely in embroidery. The material used for the work might be fawn coloured or green linen, and flowers and leaves might be sewn in almost natural colours.


To iron the transfer on to the linen, put the linen on an ironing blanket, pin the transfer in position, and iron down with a moderately hot iron. Lift one corner of the transfer to see if the design has adhered properly. If it has not, iron over again with a hotter iron.




The leaves are sewn in a sloping satin stitch in sections, as in Fig. 3, the stems also in sloping satin stitch. When the work is finished there are two ways of pressing it—one by laying it flat on the ironing blanket right side down, damp it well and iron out with



in short and long stitch. This is the best stitch for petals which are to be shaded. Begin at the top of the petal and sew a row of stitches, one short and one long; then for the next row use the next colour, continuing to make a short and long stitch,



a good hot iron. The other way is to lay a clean piece of muslin on a board, then the piece of work on the top; pin out all round with drawing pins, then thoroughly damp the linen, and leave flat till quite dry, when it will be found beautifully smooth and flat.



KNITTED GAITERS.



THIS pattern is not only good for gaiters as used by tourists, hunters, sportsmen, etc., but stockings for cyclists, etc., can be worked in the same way. The gaiters are made of Baldwin and Walker's "Ladyship" 4-ply fingering wool.

Cast on with doubled wool 84 stitches in a round, and work the first to fourth rows also with doubled wool very tightly.

1st row.—Knit. 2nd row.—Purl. 3rd row.—Knit.

4th row.—Purl.

Then follow with single wool

-5th row—knit, and the
border shown on our illustration, Fig. 2.

1st row.—Knit 6, purl 6.

In 2nd to 8th rows, knit 6, purl 6, but each stitch is moved to the left one further than in the previous row (see our illustration of the border, Fig. 2); commence, therefore,

the second row with purl I, the third row with purl 2, and so on.

In the 9th row the design is changed showing plain rows instead of purl, and purl instead of plain.

In the 10th to 16th rows the stitches are moved one up to the right (as can be seen by our illustration, Fig. 2). Now follows I row knit and 3 rows purl, then again I row knit.


The following 8 rows are purl 1, knit I at back of stitch. To knit I at back of stitch, put the needle from the right to left under the backward stitch, whereby the wool comes behind the stitch. Then lay the wool from right to left over the needle and draw it through the stitch. This makes the wool lie crosswise, and not one next to the other as by plain knitting (see our illustration, Fig. 3). Then work I row plain and 3 rows purl. Now turn and work, going backwards, the turned over top, whereby the knitted part comes in front, as the first illustration shows. The next row is plain, the next 32 rows knit I, purl I.

The 33rd row.—Plain.


34th and 35th rows.—Purl. Now begin the pattern, Fig. 4.



6th row.—Knit. Then follows 4 rows knit 4, slip 2. The slip stitches must always be over the second and third knit stitches of the previous pattern, to make the pattern alternately.

After eight patterns are worked in this way, decrease by the ninth to fourteenth patterns every second row by 2 stitches, without spoiling the pattern, so that the decrease is 18 stitches. Then follow six patterns without decrease. The wool must be put over the needle before the slip

A HANDSOME WOOL TEA COSEY.

THIS is a very handsome cosey, it would make a charming gift and it has the advantage of being able to remain on the teapot when the tea is being poured out. The one in the illustration is in blue and white Paton's petticoat wool and finished with a gold satin ribbon. Hook No. 8 is used.

To begin the cosey, first make 17 chain with the gold wool; into this work 8 d.c. then 8 treble; the cosey is worked from top to bottom, not round, this is clearly seen in the illustration.

2nd row.--Turn 3 chain, then work 8

You will then have made what forms half of the cosey.

Then make another half exactly the same. Now sew the two halves together, sewing them up each end about an inch, leaving the centre for the spout and the handle of the teapot to come through.

The next thing to do is to work a place at the top for the ribbon to thread through.

For this work a row of holes:—first rehain, then I treble, repeating this I chain I treble all round. Finish with

treble into the other 8 treble and 8 d.c. into the other 8 d.c. Now break off the gold wool and join on the white, work with the white wool 1 chain, 8 d.c. and 8 treble, then turn, make 3 chain, then work 8 treble and 8 d.c.

You have now made two stripes, one of gold and one of white, larger at the top half than they are below to form the shape.

Now repeat the 2 stripes of 2 rows until you have made 5 stripes of gold wool and 4 stripes of white.

the double frill round the top—first in gold work I d.c. in the 1st hole, then 3 chain which forms a loop and I d.c. in the next hole; continue this round the top of the cosey, working I d.c. in every hole and three chain between. Then do the same in white.

To give a firm finish at the bottom of the cosey work d.c. closely all round.

Take a yard of gold satin ribbon or a bright silk and thread it through the holes at the top, commencing it in the centre of a side, tie with a bow.

THE NEW TINSEL CROCHET WORK.


The new tinsel crochet work for evening and day wear can be had in green, blue, pink, heliotrope, light oxyd and gold.

LEAF PATTERN.

Procure some tinsel thread, any shade required, and Faudelite hook or cork handled steel hook.

1st row.—Make 4 ch. into a loop. 2nd row.—6 tr. crochet and I ch. four times into the loop. Join. Turn back the work. 5th row.—3 ch. d.c. into the third of the first 12 tr. of previous row. Make a picot of 5 ch., d.c. into the first ch. Miss 2 tr. and d.c. into the next tr. Repeat until within 3 tr. of the end of the leaf. Repeat the same on the next leaf. When finished do 3 picots on the top of the pattern and fasten off.

For the Top.—Join thread of the first of the 3 picots on the leaf, 2 ch. and 1 tr. into the first picot. Repeat twice more. 2 ch. 1 tr. into the next 2 picots, 2 ch.; make 2 picots of 5 ch.



3rd row.—12 ch. insert in the first ch. of the previous row, 12 ch. insert in the next I ch., 12 ch. insert in the third I ch. Turn back the work.

4th row.—12 tr. crochet into the first 12 ch. loop, 8 long stitches, with cotton over the needle twice, and 14 more tr. crochet into the same loop. Repeat twice more into the other 2 loops of 12 ch. Turn the work back.



NARROW ROSE EDGING.

Make 4 ch. and form into a loop and put I d.c., 5 tr. crochet, and I d.c. into the loop. Repeat three times more, making four in all, ending with I d.c. Make 3 ch., insert at the back top of the rose, 3 ch., cotton over twice and into the side of the rose, 3 ch. and cotton over twice on the side of the next rose, 3 ch. and I tr. in the top of the rose. Turn the work back. 4 d.c. in every 3 ch.

P.S.—Hooks used, Faudelite, No. 3 or $3\frac{1}{2}$, and for the picot, 4 or $4\frac{1}{2}$ cork handle.



For the Border.—Fasten on to the rose. I ch., put the cotton twelve times over the crochet hook and draw into the I ch.; insert in every other tr. on the rose all the way along the edge.

For the Top.—3 ch. and I tr. in the

Wrap the cotton twelve times round the hook, draw through the last stitch to form a picot, I ch. and fasten in the first ch. of the picot, then do 3 more tr. in the loop of the same 3 ch. and I d.c. Do the other five in loops the same way and fasten off. Make all the patterns the same, not forgetting to fasten them together.

For the Sides.—3 ch., I tr. into the picot, the picot being turned down and the ch. put between, 3 ch., cotton over twice and put into the side of the

picot where the scallops are fastened together. Do this twice, then 3 ch. and put into the picot as before at the top; when done, turn back and make 4 d.c. in each of the 3 ch. Repeat this both sides of the lace.


NURSERY RUG IN APPLIQUE ANIMALS.


This rug, 1½ yards long and 1 yard wide, is carried out in greyish blue baize. The animals are cut out of white, black, grey, light and dark brown cloth, or flannel, shaded according to one's liking, and sewed on to the groundwork in outline stitch of the same coloured wool. See illustration of Rabbit.

Bushes and grasses are worked in green wool in different shades, also in outline stitch.

For eyes, tails, feathers of the hens, etc., silk may be employed.

The rug is finished with a lining to match.






Child's Crawling Rug.





6th row.—3 ch. I tr. on tr. below, four times 2 ch. I tr. on tr. below, turn.

Now work along edge, 2 sht. tr. in next space, I sht. tr. on tr. stitch, 2 tr. in next space, I tr. on tr., 2 tr. in next space, I tr. on tr., 2 tr. in next space, I tr. in next tr., 3 sht. tr. in next space (as at beginning), 3 d.c. in last space (leaving the side of first row space free, turn (there will be 18 sht. tr., tr. and d.c. stitches in all).

10th row.—2 ch. I tr. in the end stitch of each row, turn, 2 d.c. in each space, I d.c. on each tr., turn, again 2 ch. I tr. (missing 2 d.c. below) in each third d.c.

MILA INSERTION (No. 2).

1st row.—22 ch. I tr. in seventh (from hook), 2 ch. I tr. (missing 2 ch. below). Repeat to end, 2 ch. I tr., making 6 spaces, turn.

2nd row.—5 ch. 1 tr. on tr. below. Repeat 2 ch. 1 tr. on next tr., turn.

3rd row.—2 ch. 2 d.c. in space of 2 ch. Repeat to end, 2 d.c. in each space, 1 d.c. on each tr. below, turn.

4th row.—5 ch., * thread twice over hook, hook (always between stitches) after second d.c. below, thread through, thread over hook, through 2 stitches, thread over hook, miss 3 d.c. stitches below, hook after d.c., draw thread through, work off 2 stitches, thread over hook, through 2 stitches, thread over hook, through 2 stitches, thread over hook, and through last 2 stitches, 3 ch. 1 tr. in middle of trebles just made, 1 tr. worked after missing 2 d.c. below, 2 ch. Repeat from * working the first part of trebles in the same stitch as last tr. was worked in, turn.


